The California Northeastern railroad was opened from San Francisco to Colar, on the line between Oregon and California, Wednesday. The first car to stop at Colar was that of W. F. 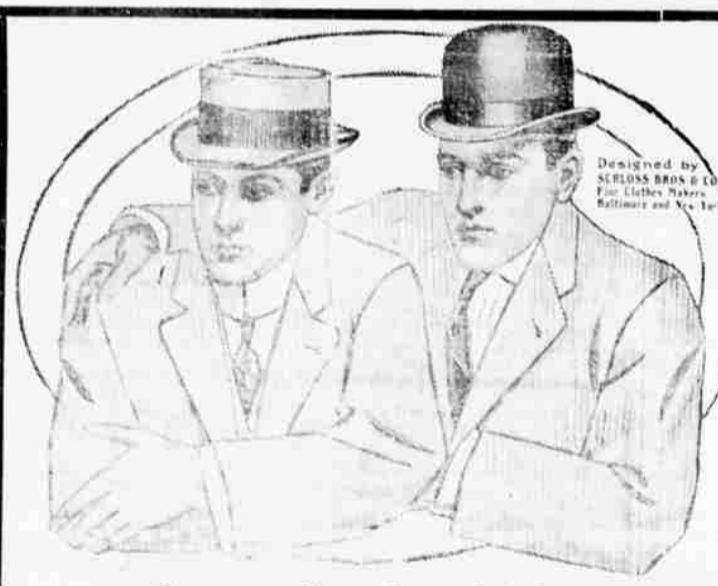
