

FRISCO SCRAPS OVER WATER

Medford Not Alone in Having a Bothersome Water Problem to Contend With

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 12.—The board of supervisors of San Francisco today finds itself in a peculiar situation in the much mooted proposition to bring water from the Sierra Nevada mountains to supply the city. The Spring Valley Water company, which furnishes the city water at present, announces itself as a competitor with the Hetch-Hetchy project. The Spring Valley officials have been quietly buying up considerable Sierra property and water rights for some time and now comes forth the charter proposition that the supervisors must ask for valuations on existing plants before purchasing water supply plants.

The supervisors may have to abandon the Hetch-Hetchy project and take the Nevada county properties that the Spring Valley company has under control.

William Ham Hall, the owner of the Lake Elinor rights, which are necessary for the city to own if the Hetch-Hetchy supply is to be protected, has made his formal offer to the city. He wants \$200,000 and all the power rights. The supervisors do not favor this plan.

Less than a month remains in which taxes can be paid and thus save certificates of delinquency being issued. The second half of the 1907 tax will be delinquent unless paid on or before October 5, and the sheriff will issue certificates of delinquency on all real estate on which the taxes have not been paid. These certificates draw 15 per cent interest, and entitle the holder after three years to a deed to the property. Personal property on which taxes are not paid by October 5 will be sold by the sheriff.

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LIE PASSED BY DEBATERS

Governor of Oklahoma and Politician Nearly Come to Blows on Platform

STROUD, Okla., Sept. 12.—A bitter political feud has developed here today as the result of an attempt to hold a joint debate last night between Governor Haskell and Dennis Flynn, former delegate to congress.

The men exchanged the lie before the debate had started, and the event came near terminating in a riot. The trouble started before the debate was commenced, when the republican and democratic committees engaged in a squabble over the allotment of time to the debaters.

Flynn opened his speech with a direct personal attack upon Haskell, charging him with misappropriating school funds.

"It's a lie," said Haskell.

"It's the truth," retorted Flynn.

"You lie, and you know you lie," said the governor.

"If it was not for one thing I would smash your face," exclaimed Flynn, as their friends parted them.

It was announced today at campaign headquarters that there will be no more debates between Haskell and Flynn, as the renewed enmity aroused by the meeting last night may have serious results.
