Advantages of Irrigation for Oregon The Rogue river ranchers say that this is one of the dryest years in all their experience and while it has greatly diminished the crops it still is not so bad when you find plenty of corn giving 45 bushels to the acre, wheat 40, outs as high as 100 bushels per acre and leads of fine fruit and melons. There are abundant water resources i this country, such for instance as the great beautiful Rogue river with many tributaries. If there was any such great streams in the desert states they would be drawn through canals as wide as these Oregon lanes and the mere desert ands would be made to blossom as the rose. There is no measuring the fertility of the Oregon soil and ultimately under irrigation it will produce double and triple the present excellent Where desert lands give a fair yield under the same unfailing process these fertile Oregon fields would become a dense jungle of garden, fruit and grain. By getting together on irrigation Southern Oregon farmers can troble the products of their farms.


