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## BUY NOW; YOU CAN'T LOSE.

Many old timers look askance on prices now being asked for orchard land around Medford. They are accustomed to value land from an agricultural—not from a business viewpoint.

As a matter of fact, land that will produce fancy fruit is exceedingly limited in extent, while every section produces the staple agricultural products. Land which is worth from \$50 to \$100 an acre for agricultural purposes may be easily worth ten times the price for fruit production—that is, the net profit will be ten times as much in orchard as it is in farming.

Fruit land values are lower today in the Rogue River valley than in any fruit belt in the world whose product is at all comparable with that of this section. Land in the Spokane, Wenatchee, Yakima, Hood River, California, Idaho and Colorado fruit belts is selling at a higher figure than in this region—in some of these places at several times as high a price.

Nobody who has purchased city or country property in Medford and the Rogue River valley in the past five years has lost money. Every purchaser, it made no difference of what, has made money. Even at the present figures, no one can buy land here without making money. It is all destined to advance as rapidly in value during the next few years as it has in the past few years, and the time is not far distant when all the land about the city will be in cultivation, though regarded as barren today.

In the Rogue River valley, with its climate, with the magic touch of water, even bedrock becomes productive, and there is no land that will not produce something that will make good returns for the labor and energy expended and the capital invested.

People who have visited other fruit sections realize much better than those who are native the value of Rogue River valley land, hence most of the profit in increase has been reaped by newcomers—and there is none who has invested who will not sell at an advance in price.

There have been instances of the groom's refusing to go through the performance, which has proceeded without him and become somewhat rigid, and several women have been so pleased and had his hand taken.

The Navajo Indians is much more amorous and impulsive, but then the Navajo girls are much shyer. The regular birth of a Navajo girl entering the post of matrimony for the first time is twelve hours. On the second instance the day is still shorter, while subsequent entries are free.
