

# LIVESTOCK FAIR OPENED TODAY

Exhibit Surpasses That Shown at Lewis & Clark Exposition

PORTLAND, Sept. 21.—The Portland Country Club and Livestock association begins its initial meeting today. The exhibit of livestock surpasses that shown at the Lewis and Clark exposition, and the races will be the best ever witnessed here. The great race track just completed at a cost of \$27,000, the immense barns and steel frame amphitheater, give the grounds and surroundings an appearance of solidity and permanence. The track is considered the best drained that has been built in this part of the United States. There is a steam railroad line into the grounds, in addition to a splendidly equipped electric line; in fact, the latter has been tested and found capable of handling 45 cars at one time. Together these lines will relieve the grounds of 7000 people within the first 15 minutes after a meeting.

No event has taken place in the last year that will be more beneficial to the Pacific northwest than the visit of the delegates in attendance upon the national convention of the American Association of Traveling Passenger Agents. These men have traveled through Washington, spent three days thoroughly investigating Seattle, where they held their convention, visited interesting points on the sound, then came to Portland, where they spent a day before making the Columbia river trip. Here they distanced, going to many points in Oregon, Washington and down through California. The traveling passenger agents meet thousands of people every year, and influence a vast amount of travel.

### Missouri Successful With Hogs.

The Missouri river valley is one of the most successful hog sections of the United States, and corn has always been the basis of this industry. Today one of the most popular stock fattening foods in the Missouri river region is a mixture of alfalfa meal and sugar beet pulp, which is produced in Colorado. Advice recently received from that state show that numerous new mills are being erected, and certainly the Pacific northwest should give this industry every possible encouragement, and this is particularly true since the great international concerns like Swift & Company and others have decided to locate upon the Pacific coast, and they are now spending millions of dollars in building their plants at Portland. A good, reliable fattening food equal to corn would make this section of the United States the very richest portion of our great republic.

The Hood River Applegrowers' association have just closed a contract for 80,000 boxes of the growing crop, and now have under discussion the sale of 150,000 additional boxes. This will be good news to all the fruitgrowing sections of the northwest.

### UNIVERSITY ISSUES INTERESTING BULLETIN

The Tribune is just in receipt of the September number of the University of Oregon Bulletin, which treats of "Country High School Organization and Training of Teachers," and is one of the most valuable bulletins recently issued by the university for those interested in the betterment of our rural schools. It contains an exhaustive account of the methods adopted by other states for the training of teachers, and discusses fully the so-called Lane county plan for the establishment of country high schools. To quote from it: "This plan will allow country districts to organize high schools, as the tuition is to be paid by the whole county. The country high school can have as good a teacher as the city high school. Inasmuch as this plan allows an enterprising district to start a high school it does away with the necessity of a vote. The trouble with the Union High School law is that it requires a majority vote of all the districts before the high school is started." Under its working, some four or five high schools are being established in Lane county in places where it was impossible to maintain them before. A small county tax is levied and each high school student, regardless of location, draws his share of the tax; the more high school students, the more money the district draws from the county. Under this law, country high schools can be established in every group of districts in the state that is not over twelve miles in extent, and that has fifteen or twenty pupils that can attend high school. The legal form that is necessary to secure a vote is given, and the Bulletin can be secured free by writing to the Registrar of the University.

### PROHIBITION DOES NOT PROHIBIT IN KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Sept. 21.—This city is now engaged in the discussion of the difficult question "How to Make Prohibition Effective." At the election last June Klamath county went dry, carrying with it the city of Klamath Falls, which went wet by a big majority. On the first day of July, in accordance with the local option law, all saloons went out of business. Many of them were changed into fruit stores and soft drink establishments, where only "1 per cent" is supposed to be sold. Since the reign of the local option law, however, there has been a very slight, if any, decrease in the amount of drunkenness in the city, and suspicion points very strongly to some of these fruit stores.

Plain drunks who have been arranged in police court have testified that they got whiskey in certain soft drink emporiums, but still there have been no prosecutions. The city authorities claim suppression of blind pigs is up to the county, as all the fines to be derived from conviction in such cases go to the county. The city aims to wash its hands of the whole matter, and tells the county, which is responsible for prohibition, to make good the protection promised under the law prohibiting the sale of liquors. About the only difference local option has made here is that the city does not get the license money which was approximately \$5000 annually. It is said if conditions do not change that in two years Klamath Falls will go in the wet column. The feeling seems to be that if the city must tolerate the sale of liquor within the corporate limits, it is far better to be in a position where it can control the traffic and derive a revenue.

### CALIFORNIA STATE GUARD TO ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 21.—Adjutant General J. B. Lauck has issued orders for the national guard to attend the tri-state encampment of United States soldiers at Asadero, which will begin October 4 and end October 15. The orders command the officers of the various regiments to report the arrival of their organizations at Asadero to the brigadier general of the camp. Brigadier General L. B. Lauck will be on duty during the entire encampment. Colonel Arthur W. Bradbury, assistant adjutant general; Colonel Winslow Anderson, surgeon general; Colonel Frederick J. Amweg, chief engineer, and Colonel Paul M. Nippert, aide de camp of the governor, will report for duty October 9. The following organizations of the state will attend: Commanding general, First brigade and staff, First company signal corps, Second company signal corps, troops B, C and D, cavalry, Second infantry, including hospital corps detachment, Fifth infantry including hospital corps detachment, and Seventh infantry including hospital corps detachment.

### Ashland Commercial College.
