Our hardware merchants are making a successful campaign against the recall of said officer as set forth in the recall petition, and in not more than 200 words the officer's justification of his course in office. He shall continue to perform the duties of his office until the result of said special election shall be officially declared. Other candidates for the office may be nominated to be voted for at said special election. The candidate who shall receive the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected for the remainder of the term, whether it be the person against whom the recall petition was filed or another. The recall petition shall be filed with the officer with whom a petition for nomination to such office should be filed, and the same officer shall order the special election when it is required. No such petition shall be circulated against any officer until he has actually held his office six months, save and except that it may be filed against a senator or representative in the legislative assembly at any time after five days from the beginning of the first session of his election. No Double Recall. After one such petition and special election, no further recall petition shall be filed against the same officer during the term for which he was elected unless such further petitioners shall first pay into the public treasury which has paid such special election expenses, the whole amount of its expenses for the preceding special election. Such additional legislation as may aid the operation of this section shall be provided by the legislative assembly, including provision for payment by the public treasury of the reasonable special election campaign expenses of such officer. But the words "the legislative assembly shall provide" or any similar or equivalent words in this constitution or any amendment thereto, shall not be construed to grant to the legislative assembly any exclusive power of law making nor in any way to limit the initiative and referendum powers reserved by the people. RACE RIOT ON SMALL SCALE IN SAN JOSE

SAN JOSE, Cal., Sept. 21.—The police today are investigating the cause of a miniature race riot which occurred here last night, leading to the arrest of three Japanese—K. Nagao, T. Nagao and I. Sato. The fight occurred when five Japanese on their way to the First Presbyterian church became involved in an encounter with four white youths. A mob came to the assistance of the whites and the orientals were badly beaten and kicked before they made their escape from the crowd. Two of the Japanese escaped unidentified. Rev. McQuillen of the Presbyterian church furnished bail for the three who were arrested. Prepaid Railroad Orders.
