### A BUSINESS PROPOSITION.

County Judge Neil last evening pledged \$50,000 on the part of Jackson county to aid in the building of the Crater lake road. The county judge made a good move. He simply took advantage of a splendid business proposition. For every dollar that Jackson county expends on this project she will receive some five in return before the work is completed, and every year thereafter a harvest will be reaped from the visitors who will be attracted to the lake.

There is to be \$450,000 expended in building a road 135 miles long, a great portion of which will lie within Jackson county. Jackson and Klamath counties furnish only \$100,- St. Mary's Academy 000 of the amount. There will be \$350,000 of foreign money come in and will be spent locally for labor, material and supplies. Who can gainsay that this is a good business proposition?

After the road is completed, year after year, tourists will come. Southern California and Hawaii are each a shining example of what tourists will do. Los Augeles to her gates by the floating population of tourists. The legislature of Hawaii appropriated \$50,000 a year at their session of 1907 as a fund for the Hawaii promotion committee to work with. It is estimated that this money will all come back with interest. The appropriation was not an experiment, but the continuation of a policy that had proven its worth.

Here, awaiting only the road to make it accessible, lies one of the most magnificent views nature has ever modeled. Such an attraction would draw thousands of visitors each year, and the visitors would leave behind, with banker and baker, farmer and tradesman, a flood of golden shekels

More than that, many visitors would discover a new world—one that would appeal to them—and we shall see Jackson county with a trebled population within a few ....

The \$50,000 will prove the best investment Jackson county has ever made.

### THOSE FISHWAYS AGAIN.

Master Fish Warden McAllister thinks the continued writeups of poor fishing in the Rogue river by the newspapers of southern Oregon, particularly The Tribune, uncalled for. He quotes Mr. O'Malley, the government fish commissioner, as being satisfied with conditions, and seems to think that as long as he is, the people of this section have no kick coming.

If Mr. McAllister will take the time off to visit the Rogue river at this season of low water he will find out whether there is reason in the continued complaints and he will learn a thing or two about this region that will be of advantage in the conduct of his office. When he was here and saw the fishways, the water was high, and it was possible for fish to get through. It is next to impossible now, even if the fish are lucky enough to find the ladder.

If Mr. O'Malley is satisfied with the few salmon caught at Elk creek racks, why does he also put racks in at Findlay Eddy? If the salmon can get over the dams so easily, why does he find it necessary to go below all the dams in order to get enough salmon to justify continuing operations on the Rogue?

The government's main work is to propagate salmon. But few trout are stripped, and the trout end is merely an incident, the hatcheries being conducted for the benefit of Mr. Hume and the Grants Pass Fishermen's union: No one else on the river reaps any benefit. When the summer and fall runs of steelhead and salmon are prevented, as they are prevented now, from fishing with rod and line ceases or becomes so poor that it is wasted effort.

There is but one way to restore good fishing on the Rogue, and that is by adequate fishways over the dams, the cessation of seining above tidewater, the removal of racks on the lower river, and the consequent restoration of natural spawning grounds, and as soon as possible, the establishment of a trout hatchery on the upper river.

When this work is accomplished, as it will be in the near future, the Rogne will again become the Mecca for sportsmen from all parts of the world, the finest fishing stream in the Union.
