

MIX UP OVER NOMINATION

Politicians Unable to Decide Who Is Entitled to Place on Ticket

OLYMPIA, Wash., Oct. 1.—Who is justly entitled to the nomination for democratic candidate of this state, John Pattison or A. J. Splawn of North Yakima? This question probably never will be settled to the satisfaction of the politicians who are just now showing they are much interested in the matter.

On the fact of the returns of the recent primary election, Pattison will receive less than 200 more votes than Splawn on combined first and second choice. Yet a compilation of the returns indicates that there will be a discrepancy of more than 1300 votes between the total first choice and the total second choice votes cast for this nomination.

The fact that if the votes are properly counted, first and second choice should exactly equal, casts a serious doubt on the question as to which is the nominee.

Pattison has been conceded to be the nominee of the democrats and has already begun his campaign.

BUNGALOW WRECKED BY DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 1.—Mrs. Henry S. Tripp is under the care of physicians here today at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. A. Howard, Jr., as the result of a dynamite explosion which wrecked the Tripp bungalow at Covina late yesterday afternoon.

The explosion of a gasoline stove, discharged some dynamite which Tripp, who is a miner, had stored in a closet. The dynamite completely wrecked the bungalow and fire consumed the ruins.

Mrs. Tripp was in the house at the time of the explosion, but escaped with no more injury than several burns.

PREFERRED DEATH TO DISGRACE OF ARREST

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 1.—Because he feared the disgrace of arrest, August Veen, 23 years old, is dead here today as the result of bullet wounds self-inflicted.

Veen remarked that he "had the blues" as he left the dinner table last night. He went at once to his room and five minutes later a shot announced the fact that he had ended his existence. He was dead before his parents reached him.

Less than ten minutes later an officer appeared with a warrant for the arrest of young Veen. Leslie Brown, a chauffeur, charged that the young man owed him \$100 for automobile rides.

BOTTLE RETURNS AFTER FLOATING FOR YEARS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 1.—Much interest has been aroused here today over the arrival of a bottle which has evidently been afloat in the northern seas for at least four years. The bottle was discovered on the beach at Wood Island, near Kodiak, Alaska, evidently after having driven thousands of miles.

Within the bottle was found the following note:

"The Western Fire Extinguisher company, 417 and 412 Hayward building, San Francisco, Cal., May 16.—On board bark Yosemite; Finder returning this note to me is entitled to one gallon whisky. August J. Hackmeier, 2818 Post street, San Francisco, Cal. This offer is genuine."

Mrs. R. Hackmeier, mother of the young man who started the bottle on its long cruise, states that on his return from a fishing trip more than four years ago, her son spoke of launching the bottle.

The Yosemite did not get nearer than 1000 miles off Wood Island.

WEBB TAKEN TO PORTLAND

Man Accused of Setting a Forest Fire—Claims He Is Victim of Spite Work

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 1.—Louis R. Webb, a hunter and trapper, who is interested in southern Oregon mines, accused of having set fire to several thousand acres of government timber in northern California, is in the county jail at Portland, where he has engaged attorneys to fight extradition to San Francisco. He was brought here last night from Klamath county by Deputy United States Marshal Nicholson.

Webb was taken before a United States commissioner and the amount of bail placed at \$5000. Unable to give bond, Webb is now in the Multnomah county jail awaiting the order of removal to California for trial.

Webb claims the arrest is spite work at the hands of some of his enemies. It is alleged by the California government agents that during August Webb deliberately and maliciously set fire to timber lands in northern California and that as a result of his action the timber on practically four entire townships was burned and ruined.

AMERICAN WARSHIPS ARE NEARING MANILA

MANILA, Oct. 1.—Wireless messages received from the Atlantic fleet this afternoon indicate that the American warships are less than 300 miles away, and at the present rate of 11 knots per hour they should arrive here early Friday afternoon.

The official situation has improved and the officials here are expecting hopeful that the disease will be sufficiently under control by the time the fleet returns from Japan to remove all idea of giving up the public reception. Many persons are of the opinion, however, that the authorities are not fully justified in this expectation.

On the first visit the fleet will spend most of the time at Cavite, where the vessels will be coaled. The fleet will sail from Cavite on October 10 for Yokohama.
