

SAYS ROOSEVELT WOULD FIX JURY

Asks That Office of President Be Accessible to Public

GUTHRIE, Okla., Oct. 3.—Governor Charles N. Haskell, ex-treasurer of the Democratic national committee, has written a letter to President Roosevelt in which he says:

"I lay aside my appeal for justice to you, for the reason that I am convinced that, no matter how dignified, great and venerable the office of president may be, the present clearly demonstrates that the occupant of that office may be without fairness, justice or integrity."

"You have clearly demonstrated that, by lawfully signing and circulating from one charge to another, by admitting that various of your charges were without foundation and therefore abandoned, and yet without displaying the manhood to apologize for the former untruthful statement, you seek another issue. It leads me to assert that I shall seek justice against you before the people and in a court not subject to your domination. Frankly speaking, I have arrived at no other conclusion than that you, in your reckless partisanship and disregard of the rights of others, would pack a court or fix a jury."

Petty Politics by Roosevelt.
"You say in your first statement that I had suits brought against me to recover title to Creek Indian lands. I overwhelmed you on that statement; adopting your usual policy, you flee from that statement without just apology and adopt the statement now that it was government townsite lots that you charged me with being sued for. Yes, I believe I am a defendant as to certain government townsite lots in one of nearly 11,000 suits that you have had brought against as many different honorable and high-minded citizens of this state during this presidential campaign, and you will not undertake to deny that petty politics—for the purpose of repudiating about 20,000 Indian voters—was your sole motive for having those suits brought; and I charge you with knowing that there has been no delay in the cases, except that occasioned by the court's deliberations, taken by himself as time he deemed necessary to consider whether or not there is any merit in the petition filed by your attorney."

Land Question.
"You say that on the land question you will see that I get a hearing in court. Yes, sir, I welcome your hearing. Call to your assistance all the power that your high office commands, present your case in any form you like. I am ready to meet it, and before the conclusion the people of America will be disgusted that ever elected you president of the United States."

"It is still fresh in the minds of the people of our state, labor unions, farmers' unions and other advocates of honest and humane government that the 10 objections that you raised to our constitution struck at the very vitals of honest government. Your threat to turn down our constitution because it contained a provision for jury trials in all civil cases is only one of the many things that you criticized, and I thank God to this day that I had the courage to challenge you at that time to turn down our constitution on that ground, if you dared to do so. You said that your opinion of our constitution would not be well in print. Mr. Harriman and P. Morgan said the same thing, but Senator Gompers said the constitution of Oklahoma was the best ever written. I expected you to agree with Mr. Morgan and Mr. Harriman, and you were not surprised."

"By you challenge me, Mr. Roosevelt, I should not undertake to make a comparison between you and me. I do not get drunk on any occasion and never did in my life, but still your letter of last winter, which I shall be glad to publish with your permission, of setting your idea of interstate commerce of whisky into public domain, is a disgrace. It was your own fault, for assistance and would cause the heart of any honest public official to sickening to administer the laws of his state as the people by their votes had made the law."

And Mr. Morton?
"You criticize my directing the dismissal of the suit against the Prairie Oil & Gas company, which could not have been successfully maintained by the state. Tell me, please, what your reason was for directing the dismissal of the suit against the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad being prosecuted by Judson Harmon and Judson, special counsel, when the facts disclosed that a member of your cabinet (Paul Morton) was being uncovered as the prime offender? Answer this, will you?"
