### THE SLINGER RANCH.

In an interview published elsewhere Dick Slinger makes some very good points for his offer of a source of supply to the city. It is the only proposition yet submitted which provides deeds not only to water, but to land for headworks and watershed reserve as well. He offers 356 acres of land and water rights covering several hundred inches of filings, on the north fork of Little Butte, about 200 of which are used, for \$7500.

Mr. Slinger complains, and with some reason apparently, that his proposition has not met with the consideration deserved, and points out that the engineer's report recommends acceptance of the Fish Lake proposition and the taking of the water out of the stream at the Hanley meadows, just below the ranch Slinger offers to sell, when a few rods further would bring the intake on the land offered.

### ANOTHER RAILROAD IS NOW BEING SURVEYED

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Oct. 7.—A surveying crew of railroad engineers is working north from the present terminus of the McCloud River Railway toward this city.

A party of hunters from this city ran across the surveying crew this week, and this was the first knowledge gained here of the fact that the McCloud people had surveyors at work.

Years ago it was supposed that the first railroad to reach Klamath Falls would be the McCloud line, but work was stopped, although the line was surveyed. The fact that a crew is now in the field going over the old line raises many conjectures here as to the purpose.

On account of the Southern Pacific surveyors now running the permanent line from Alturas north, just east of the old McCloud line, leads some to believe that there will be a fight over Southern Oregon and northern California territory.

## NO MENTION OF SLINGER

### Dick Slinger Says Engineer Roberts Over Looked Him Entirely.

"If Medford is to take water from the north fork of Little Butte above the Hanley ranch, my proposition should have first choice," asserts Dick Slinger of the upper Little Butte valley, who visited in Medford this week.

"I offered the city my upper ranch adjoining and above the Hanley tract, consisting of 354 acres and water rights covering several hundred miners' inches, 200 of which are used for irrigating the ranch, for \$7500. This will give the city its intake, enable it to fence a mile of creek bed above and keep it out and provide any elevation desired for pipe gradient and reservoir.

Both Land and Water. "No other proposition made," continued Mr. Slinger, "provides land as well as water, and both at a price as low as to be ridiculous in comparison with other propositions. Mr. Hanley wants \$25,000 for water alone, and the total flow of Wason canyon is not as great as the amount of water diverted on my place.

"The Fish Lake Ditch company offers 300 inches for \$15,000, no land accompanies the offer. My ranch has as good a right to 300 inches as the Fish Lake company. My water rights are incontestable. You cannot be enjoined, and you don't have to await the completion of dams above to guarantee the water. If there is not water enough on the ranch, and I claim there is, it is an easy matter to supplement it from the Fish Lake supply.

Neglected by Engineer. "I cannot understand why the engineer should recommend Fish lake water to be taken out of the Little Butte at the Hanley meadows, where they will have to purchase a right of way and diversion site, when a few feet further would give him all the land needed for diversion and reservoir. My proposition, by far the best on the Little Butte, is not even mentioned in the engineer's report, which is not a square deal.

"If Medford goes to Little Butte for water, my proposition is the only one to consider. I offer abundant pure water, ground for diversion and protection, ample elevation and everything the city is searching for. Who can beat it?"

### MISSIONARY SOCIETY TO MEET IN SPOKANE

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 7.—One hundred delegates, representing the Women's Foreign Missionary societies of the Methodist churches in Idaho, Oregon, Montana and Washington, will attend the sixteenth annual meeting of the Columbia branch of the National society in Spokane, beginning October 8, and continuing until the evening of October 11. The sessions will be in the First M. E. church, under the presidency of Mrs. M. C. Wire of Eugene, Ore., opening with a consecration service.

### TWO MILLION ESTATE LEFT FOR DUNSMUIR

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 7.—An estate valued at \$2,000,000 is disposed of by the will of Mrs. John Dunsmuir, mother of James Dunsmuir, lieutenant governor of British Columbia, who died Sunday. Distant relatives are given \$85,000 and the residue is divided equally between the five daughters, who are named as executrices.

### PROMISES INTERESTING DEVELOPMENTS IN CASE

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 6.—J. Babler of San Francisco, who is connected with the Alaska Packers' association, has arrived here from Wrangell, Alaska. He said with reference to the loss of the bark Star of Bengal on September 23 that only one side of the story has been told in the newspapers and that when the hearing before the inspectors at San Francisco is over there will be something brought out and that it will put a different face on the cause of the wreck. Just what is to develop in the captain's report of the wreck and the loss of 110 lives Mr. Babler was not at liberty to say. He goes to San Francisco tonight to be present at the hearing.

### DRAYMEN CONSIDER STRIKE OF TEAMSTERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 7.—The possibility of a teamsters' strike depends upon the decision today of the Draymen's association, which will consider the refusal of the teamsters' union to accept a wage reduction. The union has appointed a committee to wait upon the owners and it is reported that the draymen will not risk the possibility of a strike.

### ORDINANCE NO. 168.

An ordinance directing the recorder to notify the property owners in sewer district No. 6 to appear and show cause why the cost of the sewer therein should not be assessed against the property therein.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows: That the city recorder of the city of Medford, Oregon, be and he is hereby ordered to cause the property owners in sewer district No. 6, as heretofore established, to be served with notice, at least ten days before the 20th day of October, 1908, to appear before said council on said day at the hour of 7:30 o'clock p. m., at the city hall in said city, to show cause, if any there be, why the cost of construction of the sewer in said district should not be assessed against the property adjacent thereto and benefited thereby, as shown by the schedule of such assessment now on file in the office of the city recorder.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the council October 6, 1908, Trowbridge voting aye, Merrick aye, Wortman aye, Eifert aye, Olwell aye, Hafer aye.
