

FAIR FINANCES PROVE OVER \$68 TO BAD

Commercial Club Talks Matter over at Regular Meeting Wednesday

The finances of the recent district fair were the chief topic of discussion at a meeting of the Commercial club held Wednesday evening. The report submitted shows receipts amounting to \$1043.38, and disbursements amounting to \$974.80, leaving a deficit of \$68.58, which will probably be made up by donation of premiums to the club. On motion all of the bills were allowed and ordered paid with one exception, that being the bill of the Medford band.

This bill was referred to an inquiry committee consisting of Rosenbaum, Perry and Rogers.

G. H. Miller was employed to clean up the fair grounds.

A vote of thanks was tendered the ladies of the Greater Medford club for their aid during the fair. Similar votes were carried thanking the newspapers, railroad and citizens for aid.

J. A. Perry was authorized to select and pack as many boxes of fruit as necessary to be used as advertising matter to boost Medford by presentation to people of note as they pass through the valley.

Secretary Miller was instructed to wire John Barrett to determine if it be possible for Mr. Barrett to stop in Medford and speak while on his way to Portland from San Francisco.

The question of making a county advertising campaign instead of individual ad towns was discussed at length. A committee consisting of Colvig, Welch and Miller was appointed to meet with business men and other organizations throughout the valley to form plans to inaugurate the campaign.

STATE COMMISSION MAKES CAUSTIC REPORT ON ASYLUM

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 8.—(Conditions that are said by the state insanity commission to be a disgrace to the state of Washington exist in that part of the state penitentiary where insane criminals are confined. The commission has reported to Governor Mead, who asked for the investigation, that because the dangerous patients are granted the privileges allowed by the regulations, they are confined to their cells 22 hours every day with but two hours for open air exercise. The commission recommended a separate building for these patients.
