TEAMSTER RETURNS HOME; KILLS WIFE AND HIMSELF

When his wife appeared in the doorway Tolan fired. The first bullet struck her and the second snuffed out his own life. He was instantly killed.

EVANS FOUND GUILTY, BUT WILL NOT BE DISMISSED

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 10.—It is stated here today following the departure of the Atlantic fleet for Japan, that Lieutenant Frank T. Evans, son of Bob Evans, has been guilty of the charge of being absent from his station while acting as officer of the deck, using profane and disgraceful language to a superior officer and intoxication. It is stated that the court martial that has been trying Evans found him guilty and recommended that he be reprimanded, but not dismissed from the service. The papers in the case are in the hands of Rear Admiral Sperry and will be examined on the cruise to Japan. The result has not been officially announced, but the information that Evans was found guilty comes from an apparently reliable source.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 10.—Mrs. George E. Steunenberg, wife of Captain George E. Steunenberg of the United States army, stationed at Caldwell, Idaho, is today freed from her husband, having secured a divorce yesterday on the ground of desertion. Captain Steunenberg is a son of former governor Steunenberg of Idaho, who was killed by a bomb hurled by Harry Grebard.

INVENTOR OF LANTERN DIES AT THE AGE OF 87

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 10.—Lieutenant Colonel Charles H. Chandler, inventor of the lantern for the common lantern and a veteran of the civil war, is dead at his home in this city. He expired last night at the age of 87 years. Colonel Chandler fought in the second battle of Bull Run and the battle of the Potomac. He worked all day Wednesday on an invention, and although he was feeble, it was not thought that he was so close to death.
