

LAKE 6177 FT ABOVE OCEAN

United States Geological Surveyors Determine Altitude of Crater Lake

PRINEVILLE, Or., Oct. 10.—United States geological surveyors, captained by L. F. Biggs, reached here today after a long journey overland from Ashland. The party came by way of the mountains to Upper Klamath lake, Fort Klamath, Klamath marsh, Rosland and Bend, concluding their journey at the Crook county courthouse. From here they will take wagon back to Ashland, where the line they ran found its inception.

Elevations of the surface have been taken every mile, the altitude in each case being marked on a stake driven into the ground. Each stake bears this legend: "U. S. Geological Survey, #250 fine for meddling with this plate." In some instances, especially in the cities and towns, brass-topped stakes were firmly implanted in rock walls, showing the altitude.

The geological surveyors visited the world-renowned Crater lake, finding the elevation at the water's edge to be 6177 feet. Where the trail drops over the crater's edge above the sharp descent to the water's edge the elevation above sea level is 7076 feet. At one place where there is a sheer drop of 2000 feet to the water, though off of 2000 feet, the altitude is 8177 feet. Other elevations mapped out by the federal crew are: Klamath lake, at water's edge, 4139 feet; Fort Klamath 4189, Klamath Marsh 4529, Beaver marsh 4640, Odell 4453, Rosland 4226, Paulina creek at Caldwell ranch 4190, W. P. Vandeventer ranch 4182, Fred Shouquest place 4172, Lava Butte road at base of butte 4507, Bend 3629. Prineville elevations have not yet been ascertained, but the supposed altitude of this city is 2850.

The surveyors left Ashland, Or., June 15, thus consuming more than three months in their painstaking task.

PRINCESS FLEES FROM FATHER

Don Carlos of Spain Wants Daughter to Make Marriage of Convenience

ROME, Oct. 10.—Divining that her father, Don Carlos, the Spanish pretender, had written summoning her to return to Rome immediately the Princess Claire de Bourbon dodged out of Bellinzona, Switzerland, and it is believed that she has sailed or is about to sail today for America with her Italian wooer, Count Folchi.

For more than a week the pretender has had agents seeking his daughter, but without avail. He finally, through accident, traced her to Switzerland, where the daughter again successfully threw her father off her trail. As a last hope, the much worried pretender has sought the aid of publicity.

Determined to make the comparatively unimportant Count Folchi her husband, the princess once before fled with him to Zurich, but was persuaded by her family, who seek a royal alliance, to return to Rome.

The princess entered Bellinzona in disguise. The conclusion that she has arranged to meet the count and that America is to be their nuptial heaven is based on remarks she made before leaving Italy. It is generally known that they planned to marry in the United States.

Presbyterians in Ashland.

The presbytery of the Grand Ronde (Eastern Oregon) met at Ashland on Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. The sermon was preached by the retiring moderator, Dr. H. A. Ketchum. Rev. S. W. Seaman of La Grande was elected moderator to serve until the next session of the presbytery.

McLean has recently returned to Southern Oregon after several years of missionary work for his church in our island possessions, and his address was replete with interesting facts about Porto Rico.—Tribune.

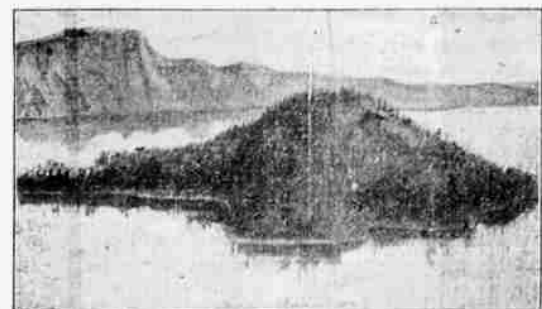
