## BUILD OUR ROADS RIGHT.

County Commissioners Owerss and Patterson have refused to order a gravel surface on the new roads northwest of this city, and in consequence the residents of that section are facing a winter when they will practically be section are menning a winter when they will practically be will be not an alwayer. A strong resolution was passed by the shut off from a market for their produce by miles of deep mud through the "sticky." The work so far completed will be entirely obliterated by the winter rains and the taxpayers will have the same work to pay for a second time.

The fact is patent that Jackson county by such work as this in the past has practically wasted thousands of Perce Indian, who told in simple landollars in repairing and maintaining poor roads. Rather than half do the work, the county had better have left it alone entirely. Measured by every rule of economy, such road building is a poor investment. For many years Jackson county has been expending money and labor to carry on a system of inefficient and shiftless roadways. It is time that this waste of public money be stopped, and that Jackson county line up with other sections of the United States and build highways that can be kept in proper repair and are passable at all times of the year.

There is but one ameliorable fact in this almost hopeless struggle for reform, and that is that every section of the country has experienced the same thing. European history tells us of the same objections as meet us today." And so, it is probable that in time Jackson county will be blessed with as good roads as it is cursed with poor ones today, for all that they need be splendid ones.

The properly constructed highway is a boon and a blessing to mankind and to civilization. In the words of C. S. Jackson, they are "like a great poem, living on in after years and bringing fame to the man who has built intelligently and for all time."

There is the economic side of the question also. Good highways are money savers. By turning a very poor road into a fine highway we reduce the cost of haulage by from five to seven cents a ton a mile. Of the cost of transporfation over the common roads of the United States compared with those of Europe, a government bulletin says: "About eight cents a ton a mile is the average cost on European roads, whereas in the United States the cost is about 25 cents a ton a mile."

Many of our states are carrying out well devised plans for road improvement. Take the state of Maryland for instance. Ten years ago the work of building good roads. was undertaken by the state geological survey. The results were an object lesson to the people, who were so impressed with the advantages of scientifically constructed highways that they were heartily in favor of the bond issue of \$5,000,000 authorized by the legislature last winter. The new fund is to be used to construct 1000 miles of road within the next five years.

If only a mile at a time, let us build our roads so that they may serve as a monument to the fact that Rogue River valley lands pay \$1000 an acre annually. It is time to par call a balt on the slipshod, shiftless methods which have Por heretafare been in use.




