These 20 nations, with government akin to ours, with constitutions modeled after ours, with similar ambitions and views, have an area of 9,000,000 of square miles, or three times greater than that of the United States, exclusive of Alaska. Expressed otherwise, an area into which could be placed all of China, Japan, the Philippines, Kotea, Siam and a large part of India and Siberia. This great area supports a population as yet of only 70,000,000 of peo-ple, but this population conducts an annual trade of \$2,100,000,000 or twice that of China and Japan combined, which have a total population of over 400,000,000 of people. Last year the Argentine republic, located in the south temperate zone of South America, and having a population of only 6,000,000 people, carried on a foreign trade of nearly \$600,000,000, or a total greater than the following with 40 months. than that of Japan, with 40,000,000 peple, or of China, with 350,000,000. make this comparison with full respect for Japan and China. I admire Japan for her wonderful record and China fo her remarks ble characteristics, but I am trying to impress upon you that, at the same time, we are doing everything we can to promote our commerce and friendship with the orient we should not neglect our own sist r republics.
