MAY TRY GOTHENBURG

(Continued from page 1.)

authorized by the city of Medford. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent any registered pharmacist selling alcoholic liquor to another registered pharmacist.

No Disorderly Conduct.

Sec. 5. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not permit in any of its depots, bars, stores or agencies for the distribution or sale of alcoholic, spirituous, vinous or malt liquors any breach of the peace, or noisy or disorderly conduct.

Sec. 6. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not sell or give any intoxicating liquor to any person who is already intoxicated.

Sec. 7. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not sell or give any intoxicating liquor to any person under the age of majority.

Sec. 8. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not sell or give any intoxicating liquor to any person between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 3 o'clock a. m.

Sec. 9. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not sell or give any intoxicating liquors to any person during the voting hours on any election day.

Women Are Barred.

Sec. 10. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not permit women in any bar or room where intoxicating liquor is sold. Provided that this section shall not apply to family liquor stores or depots where liquor is sold only in original or sealed packages not to be consumed on the premises.

Sec. 11. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not sell or give to any person any intoxicating, spiritous, vinous or malt liquors on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday.

Sec. 12. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not permit or maintain any closed boxes or wire rooms in any of its depots, bars, stores or agencies for the distribution or sale of intoxicating liquor.

Sec. 13. That the Medford Gothenburg association shall not permit any gambling in any of its bars, depots or stores.

Condition of Bond.

Sec. 14. That for the faithful performance of the franchise herein granted the said Medford Gothenburg association shall give bond to the city of Medford in the sum of \$10,000, and the said bond shall be conditioned so as to hold the city harmless from damage or other claims or actions growing out of the conduct of the said business by the Medford Gothenburg association.

Sec. 15. That should the Medford Gothenburg association neglect or fail to exercise due diligence and good faith in the performance and keeping of the conditions and regulations set forth in this covenant, the city council of the city of Medford may revoke the said franchise at any time upon proper showing of the facts.

STANDARD OIL TAKES IN ANOTHER COMPANY

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The accession of L. K. Bower of Cleveland, O., today to the position of treasurer of the Colorado Fuel & Iron corporation, indicates that the \$50,000,000 company has become the property of the Standard Oil company. Bower for 20 years has been one of the personal representatives of John D. Rockefeller.

It is believed that the Standard Oil acquired control through the purchase

of the corporation's stock during the panic of last year. The nominal owners were the Goolds, although a battle for control has been waging for some time. Financiers believe that the Standard Oil will turn over the Colorado company to the United States Steel corporation eventually.
