MINORITY PREVENTS VOTE ON ENDING OF STRIKE. WREN, Mass., Oct. 16.—By breaking into the hall where the shoe workers were voting on a resolution to end the great shoe strike, here, and by destroy-

ing the ballot boxes and ballots, the minority of the striking hatters today prevented a formal ratification of the resolution. The shoe manufacturers have consented to arbitrate their differences with the men with the understanding that the strikers should return to work today.
