By means of this work any student who has not time to attend college of high school can pursue, with hardly any cost, practically the same work by correspondence through the university courses, and receive credit for it. Thou sands of dollars each year are sent out of Oregon to various correspond ence schools and the university believes that a large part of this might just as well be saved to the people of the state.
