POLITICAL SITUATION IN
NEVADA BADLY MIXED

RENO, Nev., Oct. 17.—With a three-cornered fight in the state over the nomination of a representative at large to congress, in which an extraneous issue affecting state legislation is dividing the voters, Nevada today faces an uncertain political prospect.

H. B. Maxson, the city engineer, is the Republican nominee, but there is defection in his own party and the antagonism of the labor vote because of the Republican state platform, which indorses a state police provision.

George Bartlett, of Tonopah, the Democratic candidate, is likewise opposed by the labor forces for the same reason. The labor faction attempted to nominate Pat A. McCarren, but Bartlett, by controlling the Democratic convention, obtained the indorsement of the state police law. He was also active in aiding Governor Sparks to secure its passage by the last legislature.

Ex-Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court A. L. Fitzgerald, nominated on the Independence ticket, which has an anti-police bill plank in its platform, is considered in a fair way to gather in the labor vote. Fitzgerald is an elderly man.


The senatorial fight has been reduced to an agreement between Francis G. Newlands, Democrat, and P. L. Flanagan, Republican, to abide by the vote of the people and allow the winner at the November election to be ratified by the legislature.

HARRIMAN TURNS ON
LIEUTENANT AND FIRES HIM

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Wall street has a rumor afloat today that W. T. Van Brunt, president of the Furnessville Iron Company and other Harriman concerns, and director in many Harriman companies, was forced to resign by Harriman because he had permitted the impression to go abroad that the railroad magnate was interested in the North Butte Extension Copper Mining Company, which had caused many railroad men to invest in the company and lose much money.

Van Brunt handed in his resignation yesterday covering all the positions he held with any of the Harriman concerns. The resignation is understood to have been accepted immediately. North Butte shares are selling this week for 5 cents, as compared with \$2.50 less than two years ago. It is understood that Van Brunt's resignation is part of a plan to reorganize the North Butte concern. Van Brunt has been one of Harriman's trusted lieutenants. He was president of the St. Joseph & Grand Island Railway and director of Wells-Fargo, besides holding several other directorships.
