Hume Building Cold Storage Plant So As to Ship Rogue River Trout to Eastern Markets

Erection of a cold storage plant at Port Orford by R. D. Hume, "lord of the Rogue," indicates that the salmon king is to join the ranks of the seiners in the releatless war being waged upon steelhead trout in the Rogne river. Hitherto Mr. Hume has not paid much attention to steelheads, because they do not bring as high a price canned as salmon. The cold storage plant will, however, provide the necessary facili-ties for shipping steelhend to the mar-kets of the cast.

Between Josephine county seiners, whose senson for operations opens with the winter run of steelhead to their spawning grounds and continues until the last fish has tried in vain to escape the network of seines, the defec-tive fishways over the three Rogue river dams, the government fence across the stream at Findlay eddy, the steel-head have suffered severely in recent years. Hume's operations virtually mean the extermination of this noble trout, universally acknowledged the finst and gamest of fish, and to catch which anglers cross the continent.

As a result, sportsmen of southern Oregon will appeal for the preservation of steelhead to the next legislature and will ask the co-operation of every an-gler and sportsman in Oregon to pre-vent the seining, netting, shipment and sale of Rogue river steehead. Agitation tion for a trout hatchery on the upper Rogue is also under way.

A visit to any of the dams now will onvince the most skeptical that the resent fishways are defective in the low water stage. Either the fish can-not find them, or there is not sufficient vater to make the ascent easy. Owners of both the Ament and Grants Pass dams, neither of which are used and both of which should be removed, have refused the request of the fish warden to make alterations that will improve conditions, although in the case of the Ament dam the warden offered to purhase the material at his own expense

Master Fish Warden McAllister has been appealed to, and sportsmen are expecting that an ultimatum to dam owners will follow his arrival and aspection of conditions.
