 and other large cities did not go to the mountains at an expenditure of such an enormous amount until it became a city of over 100,000 population. We might add that if the city of San Francisco or Los Angeles had Rogue river at its door there would not be the expenditure of the enormous amount they contemplate spending for a supply from the mountains. You can therefore readily see that with your large and swiftly running river, with its inexhaustible supply, you are prepared at all times to meet the demands of its growing population.
 The Rogue river is pure, soft water, and all the contamination it may receive from the inhabitants and sewerage entering into it, will not be objectionable if a first-class filter plant is installed in your city, thereby insuring you a water supply equal to any municipal water system in the United States. Your water being perfectly soft, makes it suitable for manufacturing purposes and palatable for domestic use.
 We would be pleased at any time to appear before your council and answer and give you any data that you or they may require on this subject.
 We would also be pleased to have you mail us a number of copies of extracts printed, entitled "Rogue River for \$197,800," of which you sent us a copy, and for which we thank you.

 not like to make the city an offer only to have it turned down and the same water sold by another party from practically the same source. Now we are going to look out for ourselves."
 Another Grievance.
 Mr. Hanley has another grievance against the Fish Lake Ditch company, and that is in regard to the dam at the lake. He is afraid that the dam will give way and his stock, home and perchance himself will be swept down to the Rogue.
 "I propose to enjoin the company if they make any further alterations in the Fish Lake dam," said Mr. Hanley, "and at least force them to give me a bond protecting me in case the dam goes out and I, with my family and worldly goods, are swept down stream. Nothing but a few logs holds the present dam, and this must be fixed."

 tem will be self-supporting, and every person who uses water will pay for it, and the taxpayers will pay less taxes.
 With either Hamilton's or Hafer's proposition under city management the water rates will be much higher than ours, or more bonds will have to be issued to make up the lack of revenue, or the taxpayers will have to shoulder the burden.
 Our proposition proposes a graduated scale of rates from 15c down to 5c per 1000 gallons, depending on the quantity of water used. The larger the quantity used the cheaper the rate. So that under our proposition the gardener and those having much ground to irrigate will get cheaper rates than those now in force in the city. The rate depending on the quantity of water used, as fixed by the city council.
 The Light Question.
 Everyone concedes that our management of the city lighting system is better and more efficient and satisfactory in every way than the old city management.
 Under city management, the service was poorer, the rates higher than ours and the city went deeper in debt every year.
 Under our lease of the lighting plant the city gets most of its street lights free, and in addition 5 per cent of the gross revenue, which amounts now at the rate of over \$1000 per year.
 Our water proposition is also a leasing proposition, and under better terms to the city than the lighting system lease, because we pay the interest and sinking fund out of the revenue on the bonded indebtedness required to build the water system (which we do not do in the lease of the electric light plant) and in addition we pay the city 25 per cent of the profits (if any).
 In closing, Mr. Oenbragge, we wish to say that if you or any other citizen of Medford will study our proposition closely and thoroughly understand it, you will, and everyone else will be enthusiastically in favor of it; because our proposition is the cheapest. It will furnish the most water; it will furnish the purest water; our rates will be lower and our title to water is good.
