DEBAUCHING HIS OFFICE.

The sorry spectacle of a president of the United States debauching the dignity of his office in order to lend his support to a favored candidate has been presented during the past weeks of the campaign...

The latest insult which Mr. Roosevelt offers to the American people, in his frantic efforts to force upon them an unpopular candidate, is found in a letter penned by him to P. H. Grace of Binghamton, N. Y., a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen...

"If Mr. Taft is not elected a period of industrial chaos and business bad times will result in which the working-man will suffer far more than any other class. They are the people more than any other who will pay the penalty."

Such words from an American president are an insult to common intelligence, and unworthy of his office. Theodore Roosevelt in uttering them has forgotten the place he holds in the eyes of the world as the representative of all the people.

Such statements are not true. When the time comes that the election of any man to the presidency of a nation means panic and ruin, then will be the time to wipe that government from the face of the earth; for it will not be worthy of the respect of its people.

Mr. Roosevelt practically says that those policies to which William Jennings Bryan is pledged are such as will result in "a period of industrial chaos and business bad times," and yet it has been shown that the so-called "Roosevelt policies" originated in the great brain of the Commoner.

"If it were true that to cut out rottenness from the body politic meant a check to an unhealthy prosperity, I should not for a moment hesitate to put the knife to the corruption."

"The business which is hurt by the movement for honesty is the kind of business which, in the long run, it pays the country to have hurt. It is the kind of business which has tended to make the very name 'high finance' a term of scandal, to which all honest American men of business should join in putting an end."

Roosevelt's interference to force the election of a successor will prove of no avail, for it remains as true today as when Job chronicled it that "the hypocrite's hope shall perish."

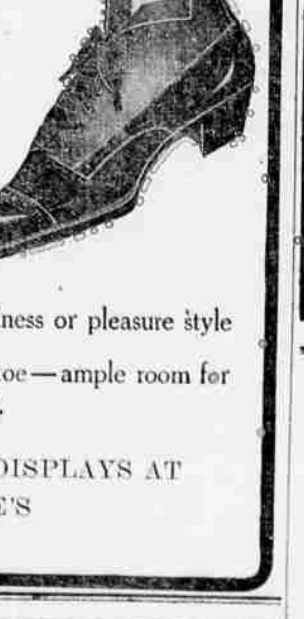
