

CAMPERS WILL SPOIL WATER

Dr. Ray Asks Who Will Provide Sanitary Regulations at Soda Springs

In his report on Fish lake water, Engineer Roberts says: "Between the Hanley ranch and the lake there are but three farms and a sawmill. Indeed, I consider that if proper sanitary regulations could be provided at McAllister's soda springs, where many campers resort in the summer time, there is nothing to menace the purity of the water down to the Hanley ranch, at the mouth of Wasson canyon. Here Hanley's large feeding yards, barn, house, etc., had it evident that no permanent intake for a pipeline should be placed below this point."

Now who, in the name of reason, will provide "proper sanitary regulations at McAllister's soda springs?" How can it be done? Should there not be some sanitary regulations at the sawmill? McAllister's springs will probably see an increasing number of people camping there every year. Where there is one sawmill there may in the future be two, three or four; and what is to prevent the establishment of "large feeding yards," like Hanley's, at any of the three ranches between Fish lake and the head of Mr. Hamilton's pipeline? And who will enforce and how can we make sanitary regulations to protect such a water supply? We might have a law passed by which a person could be punished for contaminating the water supply, but how can we prevent, except by buying all the land along the creek and making a reserve of it and fencing and patrolling it?
