WILL MOVE THE BRAZILIAN CAPITOL

Company of French Capitalists Will Move Capital From Rio de Janeiro to the Gopaze Plateau—Movement Is Well Under Way.

PARIS, Oct. 29.—A new Brazilian capital to succeed Rio de Janeiro is planned by a company of French capitalists who have taken advantage of a constitutional provision of Brazil which designates the Gopaze Plateau as the future seat of government.

Hilberto the removal of Rio de Janeiro has been considered too great an undertaking. The capitalists, however, have interested the people in the plan and propose to carry it through.

Agents of the company represented to the people the advantages of the high land climate for health and its geographical position for inter-communication between the provinces of Brazil. The company gradually won a large following and has succeeded in getting the Brazilian government to enter into negotiations to further the project.

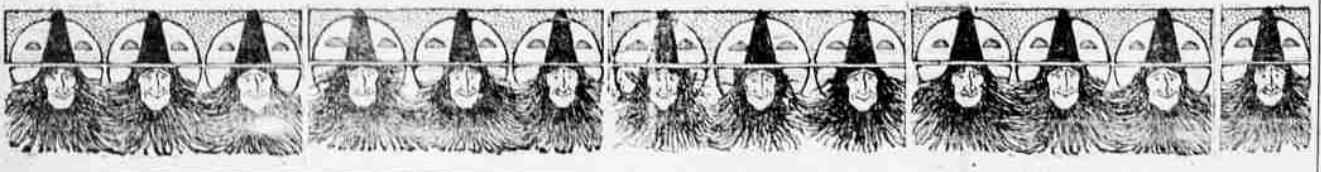
