The dispute has become so bitter that the state land office and county clerk have been appointed to take testimony in the case November 24.

The Campoodi has been here as long as any white man can remember, and the Indians are averse to being moved from their ancient home.

Both deer and bear are unusually plentiful in the Josephine county mountains this season.

It is estimated that over 250 deer have been killed this season in the Bear Camp country alone.

In this district also about 100 black, brown and cinnamon bear have been killed.

Though there has been a heavy slaughter of deer, the hunters have had due regard for the game laws, and very few violations have occurred.

Most hunters have picked their game, choosing only the full grown bucks and letting the does go.

It is the general opinion of sportsmen that deer are becoming more plentiful in Josephine county and this is attributed to the present game laws and their enforcement.

FARMERS ORGANIZE AN IRRIGATION CORPORATION

GRANTS PASS, Or., Oct. 30.—A mass meeting of Josephine county citizens, consisting of farmers, fruitgrowers, ranchers, mill men, merchants, lawyers, and men of all professions, was held at the opera house in this city to complete plans for irrigating this section of Rogue river valley.

In order to facilitate matters, and put the enterprise in shape to do definite work, a corporation was formed.

A government expert will be employed, who will consider irrigation in all its phases as relates to this district.

When the call for stockholders was made at yesterday's meeting, 50 men arose immediately and pledged their support, taking 100 shares each.
