(Continued from page 1.) Heavy Vote in Oklahoma. GUTHRIE, Okla., Nov. 3.—A heavy early vote today marked the state's first opportunity to participate in a national election. Indications point to the fact that the prediction of a democratic victory is probably correct, but that the 20,000 proscribed for Haskell will be materially reduced. A democratic legislature is assured. This means the re-election of Senator Gore to the United States senate. A number of amendments to the new state constitution, which has been an object of attack by the republican speakers, are being voted on. Voters Busy in Iowa. DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 3.—Reports from all portions of the state indicate that an unusually heavy vote will be polled during the day. Excellent weather conditions are inducing the voters to turn out early. The balloting, however, is proceeding slowly, which is taken to indicate that a great deal of scratching is being done. A further delay in the booths is caused by the fact that a republican primary senatorial election is in progress.

Special Wire to White House. WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—After casting his vote at Oyster Bay, President Roosevelt will return here today and will entertain an election party at the White House tonight. Among the guests will be Secretary of War Wright, Secretary of the Navy Metcalf, Secretary of State Root, Secretary of Commerce and Labor Straus, Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou and a number of the president's friends. Mrs. Roosevelt will entertain her friends in the parlors of the White House. United Press reports will be received by a special operator stationed at the White House, over a direct wire connected with the national republican headquarters in New York.

Large Vote in Utah. SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 3.—Basing their statements on recent political developments, republicans today are predicting that Utah will go republican today are predicting that Utah will go republican by the biggest vote cast in the history of the state. The chief interest centers in the Salt Lake county, where the anti-Mormon 'American' party is attempting to capture all the offices. Owing to the attacks on their leaders, the Mormons are following explicit instructions and voting the republican ticket. The democrats in this county have been practically wiped out in the bitter internecine fight between Mormon and anti-Mormon and the result today will be the culmination of the hardest campaign in the history of Utah.

New York Weather Perfect. NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Weather conditions throughout the state are perfect today and there is every indication of the heaviest vote cast in years. Workers for both parties were out long before sunrise and a record-breaking early vote is reported from all sections.

MEANEST MAN ROBS CHURCH POOR BOX BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 3.—The meanest man ever arrested in Butte, according to the police, is in jail here today in the person of a man giving the name of F. L. Todd, who is accused of robbing a church poor box. He was caught by Father Kennedy of St. Patrick's church. In his pockets he had \$9.25 in small change and a key that unlocks the two doors that must be opened before the poor box can be reached. Todd says his home is in Spokane.

FIRE RAGING IN TOWN NEAR SYRACUSE SYRACUSE, N. Y., Nov. 3.—Appeals for help to fight a fire raging in the town of Savannah, near here, have been received. It is reported that the town is practically destroyed. Firemen from Clyde and Lyons were sent to aid in fighting the flames, but with little avail. The fire started in a bakery and quickly consumed nine houses on both sides of Main street.

(Continued from page 1.) November 22—Committee leaves for northern Oregon cities. November 25—Committee returns and reports unanimously. Report condemns wood pipe, says Fish Lake company will be subjected to long continued litigation, and outcome is more than doubtful, and that right of way will cost a large sum. Committee recommends that \$5000 be raised to commence taxpayers' suit to enjoin the performance of contract with I. L. Hamilton on the ground that it will be waste of public money. November 27—Temporary injunction granted by the circuit court against expenditure of \$254,100 to build a pipeline to Little Butte under the Hamilton proposition on the ground that the complaint of the taxpayers shows that there is good reason to doubt the right of the Fish Lake Water company to divert the water, and that the laying of wood pipe would be extravagant for the reason that it is not durable, being only guaranteed for one year. November 30—A mass meeting of the property owners of Medford was held at the opera house on a full municipal ticket was nominated from gentlemen who were in favor and pledged to use all efforts to extricate the city from the contract made with I. L. Hamilton. December 2—News received in Medford that Fish Lake Water company has sold all its rights and property to eastern capitalists. December 5—In the suit of taxpayers against I. L. Hamilton and the others, the deposition of Hamilton was taken. His testimony revealed the fact that the Fish Lake company had never entered into any written contract with Hamilton by which it agreed to stand between the city of Medford and litigation over water from Little Butte creek, and also that the Fish Lake company had sold all its rights and property, but had made no provision for its successors' guaranteeing the city against any litigation. December 10—Purchasers of Fish Lake Water company announced that they will in no particular guarantee the city against any litigation over water rights from Little Butte creek. December 15—Public meeting held at Central Point attended by all citizens. After much enthusiastic discussion, the city council is advised to submit to the people the question of entering into a contract with Condor Water & Power company to supply city with water upon similar terms offered Medford in connection with irrigation of lands along pipeline. Council meets same evening and submits proposition to voters at election to be held December 20. December 20—Election held in Central Point gives 12 votes to 1 in favor of water proposition. December 23—Construction begins on Central Point water system. Boom begins in Central Point. Eastern capitalists visit Central Point and decide to build electric railroad to Crater lake and make arrangements with Condor Water & Power company to secure electric current from Gold Bay and Prospect. Condor Water & Power company lets contract for installing of immense power plant at Prospect. January—City elections of Medford result in election of officials pledged against Hamilton proposition. January 8—First meeting of new council Hamilton appears and agrees to surrender contract with city for \$1000, which council accepts. Resolution is adopted requesting Condor Water & Power company to extend Central Point mains to Medford.
