The hay dealers all over the state have shut down on the selling of hay today, following the publication of a report by the San Francisco Hay association this morning that there is a possibility all the horses and cattle of the state having putting short rations as the result of the hay shortage. The price of hay is \$24 a ton today as against a price of from \$15 to \$18 at this time last year,
