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THE NORTH DAKOTA DECISION.

Harvey Scott still labors under the senile delusion that he can be United States senator from Oregon and has embarked full-fledged upon his campaign of dishonor—for only by dishonor can the election of Chamberlain be prevented.

The Portland Oregonian daily snarls forth various excuses to justify repudiation of solemn pledges made people by legislators. It has discovered that the republic is in danger, that Statement No. 1 is akin to secession and grabs every possible straw to exalt dishonor and pave the way for the shame of Oregon.

The latest agonies are over the decision of the supreme court of North Dakota, in which the court was asked to restrain the people from expressing their choice for United States senator—which, by the way, the court refused to do—so the people of North Dakota as well as of Oregon have the right to declare their choice—and the republic still lives.

In an effort to twist this decision to its own ends, the Oregonian misrepresents the case and draws false conclusions. The North Dakota law compelled legislative candidates to support the party's popular choice for senator, making the pledge part of their oath of office, thus differing from the Oregon law, which makes the pledge (Statement No. 1) purely voluntary on the part of the legislator and not part of his oath of office—morally, but not legally, binding. This part of the North Dakota law, which added another oath as a qualification for office, was held to be a violation of the state constitution, though the court held it had no jurisdiction to pass upon the election of senator under the provisions of the primary law.

The North Dakota decision has no bearing whatever upon Statement No. 1 in Oregon. The decision of the North Dakota case does not affect in the slightest particle the Oregon primary law, nor does it in the least release legislators from the moral obligation incurred in their voluntary pledge to their constituents that they would vote for senator as instructed by the people.

Another point that should not be lost sight of in this campaign of dishonor is that the people of every precinct, city and county in Oregon voted in June by an overwhelming majority, for a law instructing members of the legislature to vote for and elect the candidate selected by the people for United States senator from Oregon—which vote declares in no uncertain terms what the people of all parties think of this nefarious attempt to thwart the will of the people as expressed at the polls.

Any Statement No. 1 legislator who wilfully remains absent, repudiates his pledge or in any manner contributes to the election of some person other than the one chosen by the people—George E. Chamberlain—will lay himself open to the charge of corruption.

JAPAN WILL SPEND NEXT YEAR 258 MILLIONS
 TOKIO, Japan, Nov. 10.—The financial department today announced the budget for the next year, aggregating \$258,560,000. This means that the curtailment of funds for military, naval and civil enterprises is \$84,000,000. The reduction is in line with the general policy of the new cabinet, which is making every endeavor to save money and carry the nation over the period of financial depression. The strain upon his vital resources of such candidates is becoming heavier with every campaign, and it is a question whether it will not be necessary to bring about a complete change of campaign methods if candidates are to survive and save their health.
