BUILDING FIREPROOF VILLAGES IN NEW JERSEY

ORANGE, N. J., Nov. 9.—An unusual undertaking, the building of a fireproof village, is in progress at Mountain Station, on the border line between Orange and South Orange, N. J.

Nowhere else in the country, it is said, are there so many fireproof dwelling houses in one group. The scheme is the result of the study of improved methods of construction within the last few years.

The heirs of the Henry A. Page estate are carrying through the undertaking. One of the Page heirs who has been interested for several years in developing the properties of the state formerly put up houses of reinforced concrete. Recently he retained an engineer to make a special investigation of fireproof materials and building methods, for the purpose of comparison.

Each of the houses now being built at Mountain Station has eight or ten rooms. All partitions, as well as the floors and outside walls, are of terra cotta, so that a fire could not spread from one room to another.

SIXTH JAILBREAK IN YEAR AT RED BLUFF

RED BLUFF, Cal., Nov. 9.—Sheriffs of the surrounding counties were notified by the local authorities to look out for Garfield Ruth and John Williams, who saved their way out of a cell in the Trinity county jail last evening.

The two men, Ruth awaiting a charge of grand larceny and William for a burglary, sawed the lock off their cell door during the afternoon, and after slipping the door open and escaped.

Among the prisoners who could have taken advantage of the break were Deputy Game Wardens Bond and Carpenter, who are being held on charges of murdering an Indian hunter.

BANK OPENS ITS INSURANCE AND ANNUITY DEPARTMENT

BROCKTON, Mass., Nov. 10.—The People's Saving bank, of which Ex-Governor William L. Douglass is president, opened its Life Insurance and Old Age Annuity department today.

The recent Massachusetts law permits savings banks to issue life insurance up to \$500 and annuities up to \$200 a year, the design being to enable workmen to supply themselves with old age annuities and life insurance at the lowest possible cost.

President Douglass provided the large guaranty fund required for the establishment of the insurance department of the bank. It is expected that this law will in the near future prove to be as beneficial as the law creating the State Board of Arbitration.

Five feet in width along the west side of south 70 feet lot 8, block 2, in original townsite to the City of Medford.

Five feet in width along the west side of lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, of block 1, in original townsite to the City of Medford.

Above sidewalk on east side of Bartlett street from Seventh to Ninth streets.

And the recorder is her by required to notify the owners and occupants to construct such sidewalks, at their own expense, within thirty (30) days after the date of such notice, under the direction and supervision of the city engineer, and in accordance with the ordinance providing therefor.
