### PROTECTION IS AT HAND.

The organization of a Fish Protective association to protect the finny tribe in the Rogue and its tributaries, secure needed legislation and restock the streams, is the first step toward a restoration of natural conditions and a move to check the extermination of the gamest fish known in the country's most famous fishing stream.

Until the entire stream is closed for trout fishing, including steelhead, except with rod and line, closed seasons are established and enforced, and the work of restocking gone about in a thorough and scientific manner, the new association will not consider its work accomplished, but will wage an active crusade to bring about the desired conditions.

One of this region's greatest assets is the fine fishing for which the Rogue has become famous—no less than a score of property purchasers have been located here simply through the fishing attractions, and each season sees a constantly increasing stream of money spending sportsmen headed this way, just for the fishing. The commercial feature should alone cause every business man in the various towns to become a member and help push the movement to a successful issue.

Phipps, as soon as he learned of the attempt on the life of his former wife, hurried to Denver. He found that Mrs. Allen Reed, the woman who hurled the dynamite, had been released from custody. Phipps demanded her re-arrest, and today she was again taken into custody by the police.

### 151 PLANTS HAVE CLOSED SINCE JUNE, '07

SALEM, Or., Nov. 13.—According to a report given out by Labor Commissioner Hoff today, there are 151 factories that have either closed down or gone out of business entirely in this state during the 16 months from June 1, 1907, to October 1, 1908. There are in the state 1743 plants of which 10 have burned, 2 destroyed by explosions, 64 gone out of business and 87 lying idle, making 151 idle plants altogether. Four inspections of the plants have been made since June, 1907.

### ADVOCATES REVOLUTION IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 13.—Professor E. J. Goodwin of New York, for six years assistant state commissioner of education, at the opening of the general session of the State Teachers' association today declared that the organization of the public schools of the larger cities must be revolutionized by cutting out of the elementary branches and high schools such studies as are of no value to the majority of the pupils in preparing them for the battle of life.

Only the essentials should be taught, and these must be made to apply to conditions that arise in every city public school over the land. He would, he said, form the pupils into groups, one for learning trades, another for preparation for commercial life and a third for the college and university.

He would have the trade group spend the afternoon in the subjects along this line and the high school course extended to give two years more to the pupils who have the opportunity and desire to finish a college and university course. He pointed out that the system of apprenticeship had practically disappeared, and he held that somehow the public schools must be made to take its place.
