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### THE STAIN ON TENNESSEE.

Former Senator Edward Carmack of Tennessee, editor of the Tennessean and recently defeated candidate for governor, was shot and killed on the streets of Nashville by Robin Cooper, son of Major Duncan Brown Cooper, because of an editorial he had written. The article, which brought about the tragedy, reads as follows:

"To Major Duncan Brown Cooper, who wrought the great coalition, who achieved the harmonious confluence of incompatible elements, who welded the pewter handle to the wooden spoon, who grafted the dead bough to the living tree and made it to bloom and bourgeon and bend with golden fruit, who made playmates of the lamb and leopard and boon companions of the spider and the fly, who made soda and vinegar to dwell placidly in the same bottle and who taught oil and water how they might agree—to Major Duncan Brown Cooper, the great diplomat of the political Zweibund, be all honor and glory forever."

What tender susceptibilities the Coopers, father and son, must have had to find a mortal insult in such language, to deliberately arm themselves and seek the author with the avowed intention of murdering him on sight! How little removed from barbarism is this code of "chivalry" that makes assassination its cornerstone, this hot blood that can only be cooled in the life blood of its victims, that sacrifices a brilliant career as atonement for fancied grievance!

Major Cooper is a prominent politician of Tennessee, who, during the recent campaign, formed a coalition between the democratic machine and the liquor interests that defeated Carmack at the polls. Because attention was called to Cooper's part in the game of politics, the ablest man in the south is slaughtered in his prime, shot down like a dog, and the governor of the state openly champions the crime.

The entire nation has sustained a loss in the death of Edward Carmack, but the "honor" of a political boss is satisfied, though the honor of Tennessee be stained.

### GOOD ROADS MEETING IN ASHLAND NOVEMBER 24

Ashland is not going to be behind in spreading the gospel of good roads in Oregon and a convention has been called to meet on Tuesday afternoon, November 24, to discuss the subject and take such steps for the furthering of the cause as shall be determined upon, says The Tidings.

Judge John H. Scott, president of the Good Roads league of the state, met with a number of citizens at an informal gathering at the Commercial club rooms yesterday afternoon, at which there was quite a full and free expression upon the matter of holding the convention. R. P. Neil presided and H. F. Pohland acted as secretary, and it was unanimously voted that an invitation be extended to Judge Scott to hold the convention at Ashland on the date stated.

Judge Scott was just returning from a most successful meeting at Klamath Falls and will arrange for other conventions. A lively campaign in the good roads cause is planned for between now and the meeting of the legislature.

### HUGE GENERATOR FOR THE CONDOR PLANT

A huge alternating current generator, which will add 750 horse power, 2500 volts and 113 amperes to their present plant, has arrived for the Condor Water & Power company and will be installed in the near future.

The huge generator has attracted much attention, as it has stood for the past few days on a car near the Southern Pacific depot. It weighs over 30 tons and a mile of rope belting will be used to connect it up with the engine.

The installing of the new generator is in accordance with a general improvement that has been going on at Gold Ray. The clubhouse has been refitted, roads constructed, and other needed work done.

Colonel Frank Ray is expected shortly from the east.

### WOMAN DIES IN CHAIR OF DENTIST OF ANAESTHETIC

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 16.—The coroner's deputies are investigating today the death of Miss Lindsay, a nurse who succumbed to the effects of Chloroform in the chair of Dr. Louis Graham, a dentist. According to the statement of Dr. Graham and W. E. Miller, a physician with offices in the same building, the woman was given chloroform. She had taken the anaesthetic before, the doctors said, and no trouble was feared. She went under the chloroform easily and three teeth were extracted. When the woman began to sink, the two doctors called in Dr. R. Buell to help them in their efforts to revive the woman. She died within fifteen minutes after the chloroform was first administered. It is stated that no charges will be preferred against the doctors.

### LAKEVIEW MAN TO DRILL FOR WATER

LAKEVIEW, Or., Nov. 15.—Dave Elder, the sheep king of southern Oregon, has purchased a large drilling outfit and will shortly begin experimenting for artesian water. The question of water on the range in this section is becoming a serious one for stockmen, especially for those engaged in the sheep industry.

### Prepaid Railroad Orders.

"Something which is of considerable interest to the public generally and which is perhaps not generally known is the system of prepaid orders now in effect between stations of the Southern Pacific company and all points in the United States. By means of this system tickets may be purchased at Medford from any place in the United States and mailed or telegraphed direct to the party wishing to come here. Sleeper accommodations and small amounts of cash in connection with these tickets may also be forwarded at the same time."

### Special Limited Pullman Excursion to the City of Mexico.

Tickets will be on sale at the local office December 12 and 13 for an excursion to the City of Mexico. The excursion will leave San Francisco December 15 at 11 a. m. A magnificent special train will be provided, consisting of Pullman vestibuled sleepers, observation sleeper, buffet, smoking car and dining car.

Excursion will be over the Southern Pacific, Mexican Central, Mexican National line, International and Great Northern, Galveston & San Antonio and Santa Fe railways. The round trip rate from Medford will be \$92.15. The going trip will be continuous up to El Paso, but stopovers may be had at any valid line point on the return trip.

The excursion will be under the direct supervision of some railway official from the passenger department and an interpreter will accompany the party to the City of Mexico.

# HAAS BLOWS OUT HIS BRAINS

## Heney's Assailant Turns Revolver on Self in County Jail--Had Weapon Concealed in Shoe

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 16.—Morris Haas, who on Friday attempted the life of Francis J. Heney, committed suicide Saturday night, by blowing out his brains with a .41 caliber single shot derringer which he had concealed in his shoe.

Haas retired about 8 o'clock and covered up his head with a blanket. At 8:40 the report of a shot rang through the corridors of the jail and when the cell was entered he was found lying on the floor, with a bullet hole through his head. Death had been instantaneous.

Haas had been searched twice but neither time had his shoes been removed. He had not removed them when he retired.

District Attorney Langdon stated that Haas had confessed who hired him to commit his crime but the attorney refused to divulge the name at the present time.

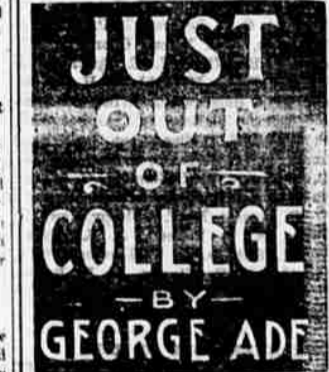
