

TOU VELLE GOES BACK TO HOUSE

Cousin and Playmate of Local Man Re-elected to Congress From Ohio

Hon. W. E. Tou Velle, cousin and playmate of Colonel Frank L. Tou Velle of Medford, has been re-elected to congress from the Fourth district of Ohio by a plurality of 7000 votes, because he has "made good." He is a democrat and made the campaign for Bryan, who also carried the district. Mercer county, Mr. Tou Velle's home county, gave Bryan 2309 plurality and is now the banner democratic county of Ohio.

Says the Mercer County Standard, published at Celina, O.: "Hon. W. E. Tou Velle has been re-elected to congress in the Fourth district by a majority of over 7000. For his second term candidacy Mr. Tou Velle had no opposition and virtually none to his re-election, his opponent, Mulligan, of Allen, failing even to make inroads in his home county."

"In Mr. Tou Velle's own county the congressman has the distinction of having run ahead of Mr. Bryan, Hon. Velle's vote being 4670, while the Bryan vote for 4458."

Has Made Good His Promises.
"Popularly known through the district as the 'man from Mercer,' because he is the first congressman this historic county has had in 50 years, Mr. Tou Velle has in every sense of the word made good with his constituents throughout the district."

"Although a new man when congress convened in December, 1907, Mr. Tou Velle soon came to be recognized as one of the hardest working members of the house. Furthermore, he soon acquired the distinction of being able to secure the things he went after. He was accorded that respect and consideration which does not always come to the 'new' member because our member was found to be no mere figurehead, but a thinker, a worker, a man who wanted to do things, and who had come to congress to make good his promises to his constituents."

The Man From Mercer.
"With Mr. Tou Velle at Washington our people feel that they have a clean, conscientious, honorable representative, one whose ability, whose standing among men is such as in every way reflects credit upon the district. Not the tool of any corporate interest, but actuated only by the highest and purest of motives, loving the people of his district and determined to repay in every way the trust imposed in him and made manifest by his selection as a representative, Mr. Tou Velle although a young man, is a fit colleague for men like Champ Clark and Ollie James and other of the big men on the democratic side, who have taken the measure of the man from Mercer and in no way found his wanting."

CITIZENS TO AID JUSTICE

Scores of Replies to Appeals for Aid by the League of Justice

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 17.—Scores of replies to the call issued by the Citizens' League of Justice to rally in support of law and order were received today at the headquarters of the executive committee. The replies contained offers of financial and moral support and in some instances physical aid was promised.

The call issued yesterday afternoon under the heading "Time for citizens to stand together," reads: "The Citizens' League of Justice is to call to all honest citizens to defend the cause of justice and advocate honest government and a clean and honest city. Under no circumstances must we allow our citizenship to relapse into that state of apparent apathy which preceded the shooting of Francis J. Heney."

"The manhood of San Francisco must never fail. That shot is the signal for us to enlist in the cause of justice."

"Citizens, let us stand shoulder to shoulder against every dishonest power and every depraved purpose. The Citizens' League of Justice calls upon every brave man and good woman to join in the cause, to enroll in its ranks."

"It calls upon you who hear this call to serve the city, to preserve its laws, to lift up its fair name."

"To this end, join the ranks of the Citizens' League of Justice. Send your name and address to the Citizens' League of Justice, 241 Pacific building."

"If in addition to joining the ranks, you wish to contribute to the fund for the campaign of justice, sign the campaign pledge of \$1 a month or whatever you wish to contribute and send the pledge with your name."
