POLICE IN SEARCH OF AN ESCAPED PRISONER

MONTEREY, Cal., Nov. 19.—The police here are searching every nook and corner of the water front for an unknown prisoner who escaped from the government military prison on Alcatraz island last Sunday. He was rescued in San Francisco and escaped when brought here to be turned over to the military authorities. The man was picked up nearly dead in San Francisco bay Monday afternoon by a boat from the oil barge Santiago. The Santiago was delayed in the bay on account of heavy fog when a lookout sighted a man supported by a plank in the water. When he was rescued his clothes proclaimed him a prisoner from Alcatraz island, but the captain of the Santiago decided to bring him here and turn him over to the military authorities because he did not wish to lose time by running back to San Francisco. The man was given medical attention and revived. The captain reported his capture to the military post, and Lieutenant Davis and two soldiers marched down to the water front to get the prisoner. The prisoner slid down a rope into the ocean and swam to shore when he saw the guard coming for him and escaped among the timbers of the oil wharf. The police were called in to assist in the search, and they have been looking for the man since he escaped. He was seen about midnight near the custom house in soaking wet clothes, and after begging some matches of a fisherman, he ran toward the beach.

The vessel has been purchased by President H. F. Alexander of the Alaska-Pacific Steamship company, who is now in New York, and has wired that he has made arrangements for the sending of the new vessel to the Pacific.

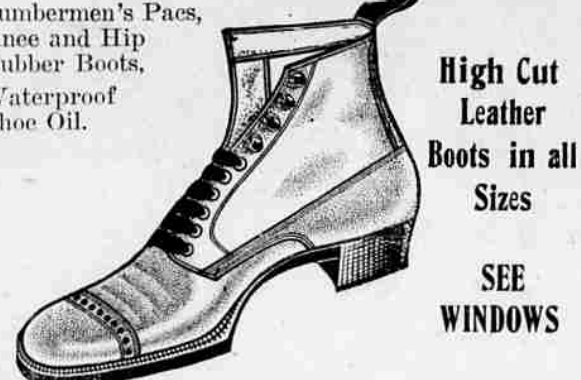
The advertisement for bids read as follows: 'The city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, will receive sealed bids up to 6 o'clock p. m., June 9, 1908, for the sale of \$365,000 worth of 5 per cent, interest semi-annually, Medford water bonds—proposals to be asked for—for both straight 30-year bonds and for serial bonds, to be retired at the rate of \$10,000 per year, beginning with the 15th year. One hundred thousand dollars of issue to be for immediate delivery, balance to be delivered as funds are required, in quantities not less than \$10,000. INTEREST NOT TO ACCRUE UNTIL BONDS ARE DELIVERED, AND PAYABLE SEMI-ANNUALLY. Bid Received by Wire. On June 9 the bids were received, among them being the following telegrams: 'Will take 5 per cent 30-year bonds of par, \$365,000, furnish blanks and legal guidance and furnish money as needed, provided city allow us 5 per cent commission to cover cost of blanks, attorneys' fees, etc. This is better than 3.38 basis interest. 'JOHN NUVEEN & CO.' After some delay the bid was accepted June 21 and the following contract, signed by the mayor, city recorder and bond buyers: Contract With Nuveen. 'Chicago, June 20, 1908.—Hon. Mayor and City Council, Medford, Or.: For the \$365,000 legally issued water works bonds of the city of Medford, Or., delivered to us in Chicago in denominations of \$1000, dated July 1, 1908, and maturing \$10,000 July 1, 1923 to 1937, inclusive, and the balance, \$215,000, July 1, 1908, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, both principal and semi-annual interest payable at some bank in New York or Chicago, mutually satisfactory, we will pay you par, namely \$365,000, and in addition will furnish lithographed blank bonds and draft of any further necessary legal proceedings. The city, however, to allow us \$18,000 as commission, to cover cost of attorneys' fees, blank bonds and other expenses. Said bonds to be delivered to us and the money furnished as needed on engineer's estimates for work done or material furnished, duly allowed by the city council. 'You are to furnish us, previous to delivery of the bonds, with a complete certified copy of the record of proceedings leading up to the issue, evidencing the legality satisfactory to our attorney and to take such further action as may be necessary to make the bonds fully legal. 'Attached hereto is a certified check for \$182.50 as evidence of our good faith in carrying out the above proposition, which check is to be used only as part payment on the purchase of the bonds and is to be returned to us if legal bonds are not issued and delivered in accordance herewith. 'This proposition is in accordance with offer made by telegram through the Jackson County bank of Medford, Or., on June 9, 1908. 'JOHN NUVEEN & CO.'
