With the threatened coming of bad weather we begin to think of the condition of the public roads from the California line to Jacksonville. The Blue Ledge company keeps in good repair the road from the mines to the California Oregon line, but from that point to Jacksonville the roads have been the past three winter seasons almost impassable. It was said that the former county officials were not in favor of improving this particular road, but that the ones selected last spring might probably give this district and the Applegate country a more liberal consideration. We are glad that the people of the Rogue River valley have taken up the good roads question, and hope they may remember us one of these days. The Blue Ledge company has spent more than \$20,000 on the roads in this district and have them in good condition but when we come to the northern end of the company's roads and drive over into Jackson county we find the roads in very bad condition, especially during the winter months.

It is a fact, as one of the first citizens of Medford said a few days since, that the Blue Ledge mine has spent more money in Jacksonville and Medford the past three years than perhaps any other three enterprises. The pay-rolls have run as high as \$20,000 per month and merchants in the valley have been paid more than a quarter of a million direct, besides large sums paid farmers, fruit growers and the general public. Contributions have been given for improvements to induce various enterprises to come to the valley, and all to good advantage, no doubt, while here is an enterprise that may mean more to the people of the valley than any three of the best of them all and which has had very little consideration upon a most important subject—that of roads over which to transport supplies, machinery and operating materials.
