YOUTH KILLED BY STRAY BULLET ON STREET

Gager, who was 22 years old, was seen to stagger and fall to the street late yesterday. Before he died the young man whispered that he had been struck by a bullet. There are several who think they heard a pistol report, but no one with a revolver could be found.

ENGINEER AT WORK ON OREGON POWER CANAL
