# ITINERARY OF FLEET

Will Start for Home on Next Tuesday -- Will Di vide to Visit Mediterranean Ports

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The itin erary of the Atlantic fleet on its home ward voyage from Manila to Hampton Roads was announced today by the nave department. According to the schedule, the battleships will sail from the Philippine capital on next Tuesday and will arrive at Colombe, Ceylon, on December 14. After coaling at this port, the vessels will proceed directly to Sucs. where they are due January 5. This means that the officers and men will spend both Christmas and New Year's day affoat, but it will not be a great hardship, as the warships have been well stocked with holiday deliencies for the two hig feasts.

After the fleet has coaled at Por-Said it will divide and the ships in twos and threes will visit different Mediter onnean ports during January.

arrive at Ville Francheen January 14 and will leave January 27. The Minnesota and Kansas will ar-
