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### ALMOST A MEDIEVAL PLOT.

The sudden death of Chief of Police Biggy of San Francisco, following the tragedy of Morris Haas, who attempted to assassinate Francis J. Heney and met with a violent death in his prison cell, either by his own hands or the hands of others, adds another link in the chain of mystery wrapped about the graft cases. The question will at once arise, was Biggy murdered, as it has been hinted that Haas was murdered because he "knew too much?"

The tale of graft prosecutions at the Bay City is fast developing the plot of a medieval story—with its hidden thread of murder, suicide and death. ### CAPTAINS HAINS TELLS HIS STORY FOR FIRST TIME

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Captain Peter C. Hains, Jr., the man who killed William E. Anna, the magazine publisher, at the Bayside Yacht club last August, today told his story for the first time, insisting that, as far as remembering the tragedy itself, his mind was a blank. He declared that it was his belief that he had never been at Bayside.

Anna is blamed bitterly as the man who had broken up his home, taught his wife to drink and smoke and indulge in army post orgies while he was in the Philippines. Captain Hains said that he did not credit the stories about his wife until he learned them from unimpeachable sources, then he taxed her about her deeds, she broke down and confessed, not only that she had deceived him, but that she loved Anna.

When his wife sued him for divorce, said Hains, the charges which she made were prompted by Anna. So terribly affected was he by the alleged injustice, said Hains, that he lost his senses and for a time was not accountable for his conduct.

### CARRIED DEAD BABE WITH THEM IN A SMALL BASKET

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Cal., Dec. 1.—Permission to bury her 3 months baby was given Mrs. Silva, the wife of Jose M. Silva, today by Coroner C. W. Palmer, following the death of the little one on a train shortly after the couple had left Benicia.

The body of the child was carried in a basket by Silva and his 16-year-old wife on the train, and they kept watch over it in their room at a local hotel last night, intending to bring it to the ranch of Mrs. Silva's parents at Guadalupe near here for burial.

### MESSENGEERS OF DEATH PASS EACH OTHER EN ROUTE

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 1.—The telegraph records at Beloit, Wis., and San Jose, Cal., today show the passage of two messages, each carrying an announcement of death, and each sender having the other as receiver.

Edward Reilly, a telegraph operator of Beloit, sent a message to Mrs. T. M. Donnelly, his sister, at San Jose, in forming her of the death of their sister, Mrs. George Fialter. Shortly afterward he received a message from Mrs. Donnelly, telling him of the suicide of his niece, Miss Fialter, at San Jose.

### SAYS NORTHERN PACIFIC WILL NOT CHANGE HANDS

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 30.—The Commissioner Saunders, who says he is in a position to know, declares there is absolutely no truth in the report widely circulated in Montana that the Northern Pacific railroad will soon become the property of the Rock Island system.

### SENATOR ELSBORN DECLARES RAILROADS CONTROL JUDGES

LAWRENCE, Kan., Dec. 1.—The declaration of United States Senator-elect J. L. Bristow that the railroads control the greater number of judges throughout the United States is taken as an indication today that he will insist that the Kansas congressional delegation shall recommend an untrammeled man to President Taft when vacancies occur in the roster of federal judges.

Senator Bristow yesterday asserted that the president usually appoints the federal judge upon the recommendation of the congressional delegation. The statement was made by Senator Bristow at a meeting of Kansas politicians called for conference by Governor-elect W. R. Stubbs.

### NO WORK, NO MONEY. NO FRIENDS, TAKES IODINE

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 1.—Eugene Tremble, a 20-year-old lad, is far from grateful today that the receiving hospital doctors saved his life last night after he had swallowed a dose of iodine with suicidal intent. The young man, after being resuscitated, expressed no thanks to the physicians and walked gloomily out of the hospital. It is feared that he may repeat his attempt today, as he has been very dependent for some time on account of lack of the necessities of life. Tremble recently came from the interior and has been unable to find work. "No work, no money; no food friends, what's the use?" he groaned at the hospital last night.

### METCALF SUGGESTS SIX TORPEDO BOATS FOR PACIFIC

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The construction of six torpedo boats by Pacific coast builders has been suggested to the president by Victor H. Metcalf, former secretary of the navy, who is preparing today to leave Washington. Metcalf suggested that six mosquito craft should be built or delivered on the Pacific coast. Delivery on the Pacific coast would handicap eastern builders so much that they will be compelled to relinquish the contract. He also told the president that he believed that it would be well to allow Trueman Newburg, acting secretary of the navy, to permit the happenings at the Newport conference to be published.
