WOMAN KILLS WOMAN; SLAYS INDIGNANT FATHER

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 1.—Mrs. Fanny Tutt, wife of Dr. William Tutt, died today from the effects of a bullet wound said to have been inflicted by Mrs. Amelia Bell Allen. The shooting was done yesterday at the home of Mrs. Tutt at Van Cleave, eight miles from Jackson, and is said to have resulted from alleged slanderous remarks made against Mrs. Allen by Mrs. Tutt.

Bud Grissum, aged 23 years, today shot and killed Robert Kennedy, aged 45, near Mayfield. Grissum, who was alleged to have made statements about Kennedy's daughter, was passing in a wagon when the girl halted him. Her father demanded that he apologize. This Grissum refused to do, it is said, and drew his pistol and shot Kennedy twice.

UNITED STATES VIOLATES LAW WHICH IT HAS ENFORCED

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 1.—State Railroad Inspector Perley announced today that, as a result of his investigation into conditions at the Puget Sound navy yard, he was satisfied that the United States government was violating in a flagrant manner the safety appliance laws, under which it has in the last few years collected thousands of dollars in fines from the railroads. Perley says that he cannot interfere because the alleged defective cars are being operated on government property.

The flat cars at the navy yard, he said, have neither power brakes nor hand brakes and the only way to control them is to rely on the locomotive brakes. This is contrary to the federal law, which demands that all the trains shall be equipped with enough power brakes to enable the engineer to control the speed of the train without it being necessary to set the hand brakes. The cars also lack impact couplers which are also required under the law.
