FACES SUIT BY MERCHANTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 4.—The express firm of Wells, Fargo & Company today faces a suit filed by several prominent merchant houses, including M. Kohlberg, Lessynsky & company, Hale Brothers, Inc., Livingstone, Bros., Inc. and Newman & Levison. Those merchants ask the United States circuit court to prevent the express company from raising its tariff a reasonable merchandise.

The allegations are that the express company issued a new tariff schedule to go into effect December 10, the effect of which will be to prohibit importation by express. This new schedule, it is claimed by the plaintiffs, is a new tariff established since August 1, 1906, when the express company announced a ship tariff on merchandise.

PROMINENT BUSINESS MAN FALLS TO DEATH

BUTTE, Mont., Dec. 4.—Word was received here today that Alexander McAnley, a prominent business man and former legislator of Montana, fell over a precipice in Teton county in a remote section of northern Montana last Tuesday while out on a hunting trip. He was instantly killed.

DEAF MUTES MARCH FROM BUILDING IN PERFECT ORDER

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 4.—With flames pouring above them and eating away the top of the building, 4 deaf and blind children early today walked out of the old Central school building with little more show of fright than they would have displayed had they continued on their march to breakfast uninterrupted.

The children, who sleep in the building, had been dressed only a few minutes and were being led from the third floor to the breakfast table on a lower floor, when flames burst through the roof. In spite of the usual excitement following the discovery of a fire, the line was not broken, but instead of going to breakfast the children were led to the street in safety.

ONLY \$62 ROUND TRIP TO SEATTLE FROM CHICAGO

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 4.—After giving a rate of \$50 for the round trip from Missouri river points and St. Paul to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, the Trans-continental Passenger association has now made what is considered to be an extremely low rate from Chicago, Peoria and St. Louis.

Word was received today from A. M. Chelard, general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific, that round trip tickets good from May 25 to September 30, would be as follows: From Chicago, \$62; Peoria, \$69.15; and St. Louis, \$58.25. The rates are considered low by railroad men, who declare that the lowest excursion rate given last summer from Chicago was \$72.50.
