

CARNEGIE AND HILL ATTEND

Congress on Conservation of Resources Opens Tomorrow in Washington

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 .- Andrew arnegie and James J. Hill will both take part in the jont conservaton conference which opens here tomorrow, one the natonal conservation commission with the assistance of the governors of the states and its other co-operators will get under way the most important part of its work so far, the report to the president, due the first of the year. These two leaders in the industrial world were prominent figures in the conference of governors at the White House last May, which was the immediate course of the reception of the me diate cause of the creation of the na-tional conservation commission. The tional conservation commission. The iron master's speech at that time on the mineral resources of the country was the first on the three dayn' program after President Roonevelt's opening speech and the railroad organizer be-gan the second day's session with a discussion of the land resources of the United States, which has been more quoted than perhaps any other single quoted than perhaps any other single address at that conference. When the national conservation commission was formed both were made members. What Their Aid Means.

The participation of these two hard-hended and practical men in the com-ing conference will be of even greater value thus it was at the White House session because the time has come now for the preparation of a definite and workable program of action to meet the situation that was partially disclosed at the White House meeting and has been made more clear by the researches of the national conservation commission

since then.

The attendance of the joint conservation conference will be composed of men who have been active participants in the work for conservation since the White House conference. About half the governors have definitely said that they will be present and the others will send representatives of their states. These governors or their representatives will be accompanied by the members of the state conservation commissions which have been named during the sumwhich have been named during the sum-mer and full. In addition to these there wil be present the special conservation committes which have been formed by 25 or more national organizations. Will Meet in Hotel.

The session tomorrow will be a more or less informal gathering in the red room of the Willard hotel for the purroom of the Willard hotel for the pur-pose of organizing. At 4:15 o'clock that afternoon comes the big general meet-ing at the Belasco theater at which President Roesevelt and President-elect Taft will be among the speakers who will address the members of the joint conservation congress, the rivers and inchors congress, the southern commer-cial congress and other organizations with allied objects whose sessions in Washington at that time will help to make up what has been called "conser-vation week." After that the joint conference will take up its business in carnest at the Hubbard memorial hall The plan is to take up one after another the main subjects which the national conservation commission has been studying-waters, lands, forests, miner

Inventory Is Completed. The much talked of "inventory of natural resources" is completed now as far as present knowledge can go. The national conservation commission has not made any of its fundings public so sar, but the members of the commission declare and the country is convinced that the state of affairs is one that requires immediate and effective action. The problem that the join conference much help to solve is what form this action must take and in what direction t must be pushed to be most effective. This is a task which demands the chrew est judgment which the national cor ervation commission can call to its aid and is one for which both Caregie and Hill are eminently fitted. The com-mission realizes that it has reached the critical point in its work. All the i formation it has gathered in its month of study will result in nothing of pe panent value unless it can be made the basis of a practical program of con-structive activity. The advice of such-men as Hill and Carnegie will be of the utmest value in selecting the points where immediate reform is most ur gently needed and those which can be placed later on the program.


Band Instruments Ordered. The organization of a first-class e-
