Has Don Fulano a Soul?

Is a horse endowed with a soul? If a person had asked me that Monday morning I would have answered, without giving the matter much thought, "no." But since that time I have reversed my opinion, for on Monday night I saw Don Fulano, a little black pony that is attracting considerable attention in Medford. And as I came away from the Bijou I found myself puzzling over the problem, "Has a horse a soul?" Don Fulano seems to be the answer.

This little animal soon proves to the most skeptical that there is something different in his performance from that of the ordinary trained animal. The difference is that he is not trained, but is educated. If he is only trained then indeed has Dr. Ellis, his owner, done his work well and so successfully hides the signals, which a trained horse must recognize to obey, as to completely deceive his audience. All go unto one place; all are of the dust and all turn to dust again. Who knoweth the spirit of man that goeth upward and the spirit of the beast that goeth downward to the earth?"

Mayhap, after all, horses have souls.

I was bred on the famous Marcus Daly stock farm in the heart of the beautiful Bitter Root valley in western Montana. I am coal black in color. My sire was Dolgano and my dam was Bonnie Wilkes, which makes me a standard bred trotting horse. I have a cute little dimple in my right shoulder. I commenced to go to school when I was 3 months old. At first I did not know what to make of it, but when I began to understand and had learned to do a few things I liked my school days very much. I have a man who does nothing but care for me. He spends hours each day rubbing my legs and body and gives me a bath once a day to keep my coat glossy.

I am almost always good, but sometimes I would rather play than work, for you see I am quite young yet, and I do love to run and kick up my heels and play.

I would like to have a lot of you boys and girls get on my back and take a ride if I felt sure you would not fall off and get hurt. I travel from one city to another and see a great deal of the world. I would like to tell you a lot more, but I haven't time, so you must excuse me. Sincerely yours,

COFFEY ON TRIAL FOR KILLING OF ACCIARDI

YREKA, Cal., Dec. 9.—The trial of Stephen W. Coffey, charged with the murder of V. Acciardi, an Italian, at Sisson, on October 30, was commenced in the superior court Monday. Judge Bush of Shasta county is presiding on account of the illness of Judge Beard. There is a large attendance at court, the courtroom being filled with jurors, witnesses and spectators. Ninety talents were summoned, and it is thought that two or three days will be consumed in the selection of the jury. It is probable that the case will not be finished short of ten days. District Attorney Charles J. Luttrell is conducting the prosecution, and B. K. Collier is counsel for the defendant.

Special Limited Pullman Excursion to the City of Mexico.

Excursion will be over the Southern Pacific, Mexican Central, Mexican National line, International and Great Northern, Galveston & San Antonio and Santa Fe railways. The round trip rate from Medford will be \$92.15. The going trip will be continuous up to El Paso, but stopovers may be had at any main line point on the return trip.

The excursion will be under the direct supervision of some railway official from the passenger department and an interpreter will accompany the party to the City of Mexico.

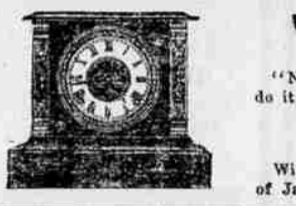
