**Special Limited Pullman Excursion to the City of Mexico.**

Tickets will be on sale at the local office December 12 and 13 for an excursion to the City of Mexico. The excursion will leave San Francisco December 15 at 11 a. m. A magnificent special train will be provided, consisting of Pullman vestibuled sleepers, observation sleeper, buffet, smoking car and dining car.

Excursions will be over the Southern Pacific, Mexican Central, Mexican National line, International and Great Northern, Galveston & San Antonio and Santa Fe railways. **BODY OF BOY FOUND IN SACRAMENTO RIVER**

DUNSMUIR, Cal., Dec. 11.—The 6-year-old son of J. L. Smith, a brakeman in the employ of the Southern Pacific, was drowned yesterday afternoon in the Sacramento river at this point, the body being recovered this morning.

The little boy was attending school this session. He was in the habit of returning to his home at a certain hour, and yesterday when he failed to appear on time, much uneasiness was felt. Finally a search was instituted, but to no avail when darkness fell. It was feared then that the child had been drowned.

This morning the search was renewed and the body was found in the river back of the Southern Pacific roundhouse.

**O'GARA TALKS ON TOMORROW**

**Meeting Will Be Held in Angle Opera House—Will Illustrate Lecture**

Of the 1186 pests that have been identified in the United States that feed on and bring destruction to the orchards, vineyards, gardens and farm crops, Rogue River valley has but 14 of them. The other 1172 are headed this way, and if the most rigorous enforcement of the pest inspection laws is not had, from one to a dozen new pests will show up each season in this valley to add to the farmer's burdens. It was only two years ago that the pear blight got in here from California. The melon wilt is a recent importation and the anthracnose has not been here long enough to be counted a native, and the other pests are all importations for Rogue River valley, when white men first settled here was a farmer's paradise in its freedom of pests.

The pests that have been brought in here are in a fair way to be subjected and even exterminated so vigorous has been the warfare against them. But the problem that is seriously confronting the orchardists, the gardeners and the farmer is how to keep out the multitude of pests that are likely to come here and to recognize them should they make their way into the valley. To be forewarned in the pest warfare is to have the battle half won for the farmer. And this is what Professor P. J. O'Gara of the department of agriculture is doing in the series of lectures that he is giving in Medford under the auspices of the Rogue River Horticultural society. At the lecture that he will give this Saturday afternoon in this city, he will fully describe the pests now in Rogue River valley and those that are likely soon to be here. That the fruit-growers may see what these pests look like and be able to recognize them should they appear in their orchards, Professor O'Gara will show 150 different kinds by means of stereopticon views, the slides for which were received from the department of agriculture.

Every person interested in fruit-raising, gardening and farming should attend this lecture, for the information to be gained will enable them to save thousands of dollars in the fight against the pests.

Remember that the lecture will begin promptly at 1:30 p. m., as Professor O'Gara has to leave on the 3:20 train for California, where he is to join the staff on a farmers' institute train that is to traverse a part of that state for the next two weeks. And also remember that the place of holding the meeting is at the Angle opera house. It was first planned to hold it in the Savoy theater, but the attendance of fruit-growers promises to be so large that a larger hall was found to be a necessity.
