WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Senator Aldrich of Rhode Island today introduced in the senate a resolution looking toward the censuring of Roosevelt for his action in connection with the employment of secret service men. The resolution refers the matter to the senate appropriation committee and involves the investigating of the whole secret service organization.
