THOUSANDS OF OYSTERS. ARE GOING TO WASTE 1996

BALTIMORE Mr., Dec. 18 .- Since the oyster season opened thousands of bushels of fine Chesapeake Bay oysters have gone to waste, the dealers being anable to find a market which would net reasonable profits.

For the first time since the civil war probably a dozen eggs will buy a bushel of oysters and that bushel will open nearly a gallor. The cost of opening-20 cents-is atmost the price of the oysters.

This is the best season for oysters in a good many years, but for the oys-ter packer and shipper it is the poorest in many seasons,

The systers are large, fine and plen-tiful, but there is no market for them. The stringent times is largely responwibte

It is thought that the arrival of the holiday season will result in an increas-ed domand for the bivalves, but in the meantime the concerns engaged in the oyster business have suffered heavy loss through their inability to market their preduct.




