the finest trout fishing stream in the United States, but has heretofore been almost inaccessible to the sportsman on account of being located on the reservation and the lands being in the ownership of the Indians.

R. C. Spink, of Klamath agency, has succeeded in securing a five-year lease on the lands along both sides of the stream for a distance of a mile. This includes practically all of the choice camping and fishing grounds along this stream. It is the plan of Mr. Spink to form a company to handle the tourist trade to this point. At least he will have an agent in this city to furnish information and look after the transportation of tourists going to the resort.

It is the intention of Mr. Spink to put from 20 to 30 good, comfortable tent houses for sleeping quarters and a large dining room. The accommodations will be first-class and a first-class table will be set. No campers will be allowed on the grounds and with plenty of boats the patrons of the resort will have the exclusive right to these fine fishing grounds without the intrusion of outsiders.

### WILL DISPLAY NORTHWEST APPLES IN FLORIDA

SPOKANE Wash., Dec. 19.—Visitors to the Florida state fair at Tampa, beginning February 3, will have an opportunity to see some of the prize-winning apples displayed at the National apple show in Spokane December 7 to 12, when seven judges, headed by H. M. Dunlap of Illinois, president of the National Apple Growers' association, awarded premiums amounting to \$35,000 to competitors from all parts of the country. In the exhibit to be made at Tampa by the Spokane chamber of commerce there will be displays of apples which scored 96 1/4 out of the possible 100 points and won for Michael Horan of Wenatchee, Wash., the title of apple king of America, also \$1425 in prize money; also samples of the prize-winning exhibit entered by H. M. Gilbert of North Yakima, who scored 93 1/2 points with a full car of 630 boxes or 70,560 Winesap apples. Buyers from England declared the Gilbert exhibit marvelous. There will also be individual displays representative of the Yakima, Wenatchee, Spokane, Kettle Falls, Snake river valleys and points in Montana, Oregon, northern Idaho and British Columbia.

### NO MORE WORK ON TULE LAKE OUTLET

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Dec. 19.—Water has been turned into the second excavation made in the attempt to increase the flow of the Tule lake outlet. Again the water would not sink as fast as it does in the original opening, and the formation of the earth is of different character, being similar to that encountered in making the first large excavation. The water sinks gradually, but does not disappear with the road that companies the stream, making its escape through the outlet first discovered.

No more work will be done on the outlet this year, but it is the intention of the reclamation service to make further experiments in the spring. It is likely that a tunnel will then be driven to determine, if possible, the destination of the water that makes its way into the interior of the earth.
