

BROWARD HAS FINISHED
FOUR YEARS AS GOVERNOR

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 7.—Governor N. B. Broward will end his four-year term today, and will be succeeded tomorrow by Governor-elect Albert W. Gilchrist. The event will be celebrated by Tallahasseans and Floridians generally in an appropriate manner, and the inaugural ceremony and festivities are expected to be unusually impressive and brilliant.

Special trains will be run to Tallahassee from various sections of the state, and several companies of militia will take part in the ceremonies.

Governor Broward, whose administration has been one of pleasing success to his friends and constituents, will move his family back to Jacksonville, where they have lived for years. Exactly what business the governor will pursue has not been made known, but it is understood that he will again be in the race for the United States senate two years from now.

ORDINANCE NO. —

An ordinance amending section 3 of ordinance No. 30, approved February 10, 1902, by fixing the liquor license in Medford, Oregon, at the sum of \$800 per annum.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. That section 3 of ordinance No. 30 of the city of Medford, Oregon, entitled "An ordinance to regulate the licensing and sale of spirituous, vinous and malt liquors in the city of Medford, and the manner of enforcing said regulations, and to repeal all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance," approved February 10, 1902, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after February 1, 1909, and all persons now conducting the business aforesaid under license from the city, shall, on or before said date, pay to the city treasurer a sum equal to the difference between the license paid by such person and the license exacted hereby proportionate to the length of time remaining of the time for which their respective licenses were issued, and up on the failure of any such person so to do within said time, his license shall by such failure be deemed canceled and revoked without further proceeding by the council, and he shall be punished as by ordinance elsewhere provided.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, in so far as they so conflict.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council January 5, 1909, Trowbridge voting aye, Merrick no, Eiffert aye, Wortman no, Hafer aye, O'Neil absent.

LENN COUNTY GRANGE OPPOSES STATE ROAD

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 7.—In addition to the recent action of the Good Roads league in passing resolutions opposing a state highway, the Linn County Grange has taken adverse action, contending that the money required in the construction of such a highway will be a fine thing for the automobilists of the state and of small practical value to the farmer and tiller of the soil. The amount of money required for such a highway could be put to better use in building and improving the highways leading to the centers of trade and commerce, the grangers argue. The matter of providing a state engineer is also opposed on the ground that the county can handle the road question to better advantage without state aid in the way of giving orders and spending money in maintaining the necessary officers to direct the campaign. The grange expresses itself favorable to the good roads movement and desires to see better highways extending in every direction throughout the state.

THREE KILLED IN BATTLE THAT FOLLOWS WEDDING

DALLAS, Tex., Jan. 7.—A wedding took place today in the village of Prairie Lea, Tex., between members of two families between the heads of which ill-feeling existed. Edward Booth was the bridegroom, Henry Goals was the father of the bride, and Younger Goals was a brother of the bride. The male members of the families met in the street soon after the marriage ceremony. Booth, the bridegroom, saw that the elder Goals was drawing his pistol, and in self-defense fired at the same instant that Goals discharged his weapon. Goals fell dead and his son-in-law fell wounded.

POLICE SUPPRESS PARIS YELLOW NEWSPAPER

PARIS, Jan. 7.—The police inquiry into the attempt of an unemployed waiter named Mattis to pull President Falliere's beard in the street has revealed that Mattis was associated with the Yellow Syndicate, a royalist organization, on the police today sealed up the office of the syndicate's newspaper until the premises are thoroughly searched.

DIPLOMATIC CORPS TO BE ENTERTAINED BY TEDDY

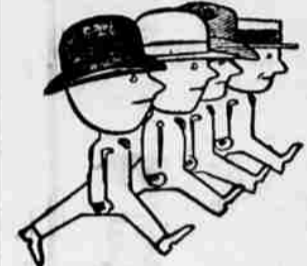
