Governor Broward, whose administra tion has been one of pleasing success to his friends and constituents, will move his family back to Jacksonville, where they have lived for years Exactly what business the governor will pursue has not been made known, but it is under-stood that he will again be in the race for the United States genate two years

ORDINANCE NO. -

An ordinance amending section 3 of ordinance No. 30, approved February 10, 1902, by fixing the liquor license in Medford, Oregon, at the sum of \$800 per annum

The city of Medford doth ordain as

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:
Section 1. That section 3 of ordinance No. 30 of the city of Medford, Oregon, entitled "An ordinance to regulate the Heensing and sale of spiritous, vinous and mait liquors in the city of Medford, and the manner of enforcing said regulations, and the camping and Medford, and the manner of enforcing said regulations, and to repeat all or-dinances and parts of ordinances in con-flict with this ordinance," approved February 10, 1902, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as fol-lows: "Section 3. Before any person shall obtain a license to sell spiritous, vinous or malt liquors, he shall pay to the city treasurer and take his re-ceipt therefor, as follows: For a license for one year-to sell spiritous, vinous for one year to sell spiritous, vinous or malt liquors, the sum of eight hun dred dollars; for a license for six months to sell any such liquors, the sum of four hundred dollars; and no license shall be granted for a shorter period than six months; and no license shall be trans ferred to any other person by the per-son to whom it is issued, except by the consent of the city council duly entered upon the records of said council; and the council may refuse to consent to any such transfer, and may refuse a license whenever, in its judgment, the applicant is not a proper person to have such license, or the building or part of the city in which said applicant pro-poses to carry on such business is not same reasons it may cancel and revoke. any license issued, upon refunding a proportionate part of the money received therefor

Section 2. This ordinance shall be full force and effect on and after Pebruary 1, 1909, and all persons now conducting the business aforesaid un-der license from the city, shall, on or before said date, pay to the city treas urere a sum equal to the difference between the license paid by such per son and the license exacted hereby pro-portionate to the length of time remaining of the time for which their respective licenses were issued, and up on the failure of any such person so to do within said time, his license shall by such failure be deeped enneeled and revoked without further proceeding by the council, and he shall be punished as by ordinance elsewhere provided, Section 3. All ordinances and parts

of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, in so far as they so


