Brewster's Millions.

FORCES READY TO COMENCE TO DO BATTLE WORK SHORTLY

Full Attendance Expected Tuesday When the First Ballot Will be Cast

General Manager O'Brien of Harriman's Lines Back From the East.

For election of United States senator in the Oregon legislature next Tuesday big preparations are under way both on the Chamberlain and anti-Chamberlain sides. Foes of Chamberlain will continue their tactics of blocking Chamberlain, in the hope of first breaking up his statement republican support and later uniting fragments of it with the anti-Chamberlain forces for election of some republican. While Fulton's supporters are taking the lead in the anti-Chamberlain forces, they say that they are willing to give way to any republican of whatever faction.

Tuesday's voting will take place in each house separately, and if Chamberlain shall not then receive a majority in each house, the balloting next day and on subsequent days shall be in joint assembly, wherein the winner must receive a majority of all the votes cast—either 46 or less, depending on the number of absentees.

Full Attendance Expected.

From the looks of things there will be a full attendance and the required majority of the 90 members will be 46. To defeat Chamberlain on Tuesday, at least four statement legislators will be needed to vote against Chamberlain. In the joint assembly at least six statement members will be needed to vote against the governor.

Chamberlain's opponents are full of happy expectations for Tuesday—which indicates their belief that four statement republicans will vote against Chamberlain in one house or the other. More than that number are said to have signified opposition to Chamberlain, on account of his refusal to resign the governorship after election to the senatorship.
