JOSEPHINE FRUIT INSPECTOR MAKES ANNUAL REPORT

Fruit Inspector Hatcham made his report to the county court last week, covering a period of three and one-half months since he has been in office, says the Courier.

Following is a summary of his report to the county court:

Since being appointed fruit inspector, September 15, 1908, I have personally inspected 450 orchards and lots containing fruit trees aggregating thus far about 1600 acres.

Three nurseries have been inspected and some few trees condemned in each. Five lots of nursery trees shipped in from out of the state have passed inspection with the loss of about 100 trees from Missouri.

A complete record of all this work has been kept with name and address of each grower, and condition of his orchard. The expense of this inspection to the county for 1908 was \$287.50.
