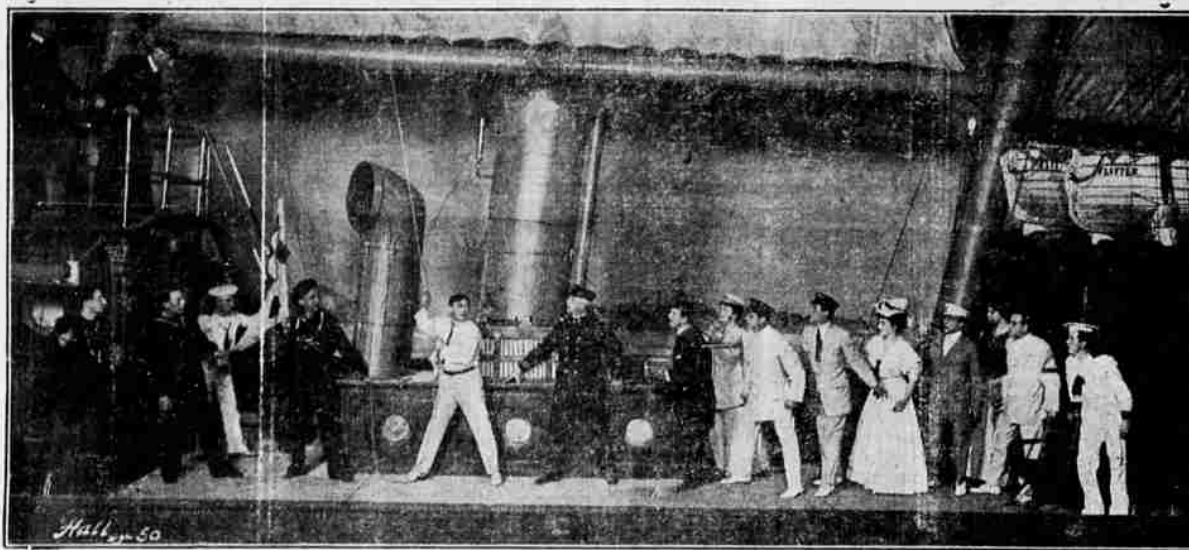

Mrs. Irene Hampton Isaacs and Miss Grace Josephine Brown Please Very Large Audience.

In Mrs. Irene Hampton Isaacs and Miss Grace Josephine Brown, Medford has two accomplished musicians of whom any community might be proud. Their delightful recital at the Medford theater Tuesday night was attended by a most appreciative audience, whose enthusiasm vented itself in applause that brought forth frequent encores. The night was a very stormy one, the torrents of rain keeping away many who would otherwise have attended, yet the house was comfortably filled with music lovers, who thoroughly enjoyed the classic program. Mrs. Isaacs opened the program with a nocturne by Chopin, which was followed by a Chopin waltz, both of which were rendered with skill and emotion that appealed to the listeners. Miss Brown followed with an aria from Handel, "Lascia Ch'io Pianga." Her sweet clear voice delighted her auditors and showed her marked improvement over her last concert. Classic numbers followed in rapid succession. Mrs. Isaacs and Miss Brown alternated, each number being more enthusiastically received than the one preceding. Webber's Rondo (Pomp and Circumstances) and Schubert's Dischordant and Quirritando (Arabians) perhaps being better received than the others. Miss Brown's "Happy Love Song," by Herbert, and the "Four Leaf Clover," being as an encore, won the hearts of the less classical of her auditors. Her honey and dash characterized Mrs. Isaacs' playing, vivacity and abandon Miss Brown's solos. Altogether it was the greatest treat Medford music lovers have enjoyed for many a day.

equipped city hall and fire engine house the city is supplied with substations in various parts of town, equipped with small but efficient chemical engines, which are supplemented by hose wagons. The central fire station is equipped with a first-class combination chemical engine, a good team of horses, hose and other equipment; and comfortable quarters for the men on duty at the engine house.

Recommendations

Nevertheless, while the people of Medford are justified in taking pride in her achievements, it must not be lost sight of that the work must continue.

With regard to the water system, the method of collection and the water rates should be closely watched, as in these particulars there is much room for loss, both by having inequitable rates and so discouraging the use of water and by lack of sufficient care in collecting the moneys to which the city is actually entitled.

The distributing system should also be extended as far as this is possible, so as to enable a more rapid development of the city, and at the same time produce an increased revenue for the water system.

The matter of adjustment of the differential between the Central Water company and the city has already been touched upon, but in addition to the settlement of these differences care should be taken that the company consent to increase its service, both public and private, as fast as the growth of the city warrants it.

The sewer question is one of the greatest importance, and is one which will require much careful consideration, owing to the lack of gradient in the city all contemplated sewers should be very carefully planned, so that not only the present needs will be protected, but future ones may attach to the present system.

Commends Work of Ladder

The work of the Greater Medford club in beautifying the city and of the library association in securing the cooperation of the State Library in its endeavor for the maintenance of a free library in Medford is deserving of the highest praise, and they should in every way be encouraged to continue their work. As soon as the completion of the new water system enables the city to abolish the old water tower near the West Side school, the Greater Medford club should be urged to take possession of the block on which it stands and include it in the park. These two blocks would make a most attractive park for the city, and would also furnish an ideal site for a Carnegie library, should the ladies be successful in their efforts to obtain one.

In conclusion I wish once more to refer to the remarkable progress which Medford has made during the past two years. Her growth has been phenomenal, and the enterprise of her people has aroused favorable comment and only throughout the state, but in the east as well.

The wonderful development of resources which has taken place during the last few years is, however, but a small matter compared with the resources as yet undeveloped, and nothing can prevent still greater progress in the future except the failure of the people of the community to realize and embrace their opportunities. A continued and united effort for progress, such a careful, strict and economical, but not parsimonious administration of

city affairs will keep Medford at the front of the march of progress, where she is and belongs.

Funeral of Mrs. Huth

The funeral of Mrs. Ernest Huth, who died January 15, was held January 19, Rev. W. C. Reuter officiating. Her maiden name was Blanche Amelia Schneider. She was born at Alma, W. Va., March 17, 1877. She did not ignore the great subject of God and divine things, but early in life gave them thought, uniting with the German Reformed church, and was a Sabbath school teacher in it some on March 17, 1903, she was united in marriage with Ernest Huth. From this union there sprang three children, two of whom survive her. In April, 1907, she, with her husband, removed from the state of Washington to Medford, where they have resided since. For some time she had been in feeble health. She died suddenly on the evening of Friday, January 15, thus attaining to an age of 31 years, 9 months and 29 days. She leaves a husband, two children, three brothers, five sisters and a large circle of friends to mourn her departure.
